HISTORICAL NOTE

The Carlisle Indian Industrial School was founded by Lieutenant Richard Henry Pratt. In 1875, Pratt was responsible for transporting Native Americans identified as subversive to a prison in St. Augustine, Florida, where he eventually conceived the idea of a school. Approval was ultimately given for a school to be established at the deserted military barracks in Carlisle, Pennsylvania. In October 1879, the first students began arriving at the United States Training and Industrial School at Carlisle Barracks.

John Nicholas Choate was the principal photographer of the Carlisle Indian School from its opening in 1879 until his death in 1902. During this time, he captured thousands of images of Carlisle's students, staff, buildings, and visitors. Some of these photographs were sold commercially through the school's publications and through his studio on West Main Street in town. Others, especially including individual and group portraits, may have been purchased by individual students for their own personal use. His photographs are now iconic to the Carlisle Indian School, and provide an extensive record of visual documentation of the school's early history.

It is not clear exactly how his studio's contents were dispersed after his death. However, a large collection of the materials from his studio can now be found at both the Smithsonian Institution and the Cumberland County Historical Society. The provenance of the glass plate negatives in this collection is unknown, but the large majority are unique and do not exist in contemporaneous print format.

COLLECTION DESCRIPTION

The John Nicholas Choate Glass Plate Negative Collection is housed in one photograph box. These materials were purchased as a group from a private seller in 2017. The glass plate negatives are of three distinct sizes. Some plates are heavily damaged, including cracks in the glass, affixed slips of paper, and disintegrating image coatings. The collection has been organized into four categories: Identified Individuals, Identified Groups, Unidentified Individuals, and Unidentified Groups.

The Identified Individuals section includes fifteen (15) individual portraits of male and female students at the school. Identifications come largely from names etched into the film at the time of creation, although some further identifications were made from existing prints and comparison with other identified images. One individual, Adam McCarty, has two plates, as indicated below.

The Identified Groups section includes six (6) group portraits for groups of two or more individuals. Identifications come largely from names etched into the film at the time of creation, although some further identifications were made from existing prints and comparison with other identified images.

The Unidentified Individuals section includes thirteen (13) individual portraits that are currently unidentified. These plates are organized by the gender of the subject, and then by apparent age. At least one individual, a young male, has two plates, as indicated below.

The Unidentified Groups section includes five (5) group portraits that are currently unidentified. These plates are organized based on the size of the group.
