Miss Luckenbach:

Replying to yours of 2nd ult., which has been sent to me by Capt. Bullis, I would inform you that Alaneo C. Wood, a young San Carlos Apache who returned here from the Carlisle school a few months ago, was killed on January 20, 1893, by an Apache Indian of same tribe named "Skoomah." The latter was drunk at the time and had just before killed an old woman by shooting her--accidentally as he claims-- Young Wood, who was perfectly sober, was endeavoring to arrest "Skoomah" when the latter, becoming enraged, killed him, firing two shots into his body. The murderer was duly apprehended and is now in confinement awaiting trial by the civil authorities at Globe, Arizona. Young Wood was a manly, fine young fellow--about the best of the Carlisle pupils I had ever come in contact with. It was my intention to employ him in some clerical capacity at this Agency; and I regret his death very much, as a young man of his good qualities exerted a very wholesome influence on the other Indians of the reservation.
