It is also reported that you left school without permission, and this puts you on the list of deserters. It is believed that you should arrange to continue your studies elsewhere than at Carlisle.

Sir:

I respectfully submit below a copy of a state-
ment that was issued by the Disciplinarian at this
School regarding the Leo C. White who is referred to
in Office letter of September the 20th:

"I have consulted the head of Conway Hall
where Leo White attended school last year and
Professor Hutchinson seems to think that White
did not take advantage of his chance in at-
tending that institution but manifested an in-
different attitude toward his class work. His
deportment was good but his attendance was some-
what irregular and Mr. Hutchinson says that he
does not compare favorably with the other Indian
boys such as Welch, Long, Broker or Eastman in
his school activities.

About the Quarters I have found his deportment
good and his general conduct is good. I have no
knowledge of his other work other than I have
stated. I believe that a thorough understanding
as to the interest he is expected to put into his
school and impressing him with the fact that if
he does not wake up to the chance extended him

by this school that he will be sent home that he will do good work the coming year. He ran away from school here last year."

I respectfully report further that Leo C. White was refused permission to return to Carlisle this year because he did not take advantage of his opportunities by regular attendance at Conway Hall. His absences from class were inexcusable, and for the reason that a boy who is given the privilege of attending school in the borough of Carlisle cannot be given the same careful oversight that is given students who work in the Departments at this school it is my opinion that this boy cannot be trusted to make good use of his time.

White's leaving the school without permission as he did toward the close of last year was desertion. There are good schools in the West which he can attend if he is in earnest and, as it will not be in the interests of good discipline at Carlisle for him to return here, I recommend as above indicated.

Our records contain the information that White is now 22 years of age.

I have the honor of addressing you today. It is in regard to my attending school at Comway Hall, Carlisle, Pa. for the past year.

I paid my own fare out there and went to the Indian School, after I entered the Indian School I was too far advanced to attend the said school, so I attended Comway Hall Preparatory School, of course I boarded at the Indian School and kept the rules of the Indian School the same as these other boys. I ~~see~~ also paid my own fare in June and returned home to Nebraska on account of my mother's illness. My record is good at the School. I wrote to the Superintendent of the Indian School M. Friedman in regard to my returning to the school for the purpose of finishing my studies at Comway Hall.

He wrote me August 5th in answer to my letter. Inclosed please find the copy of Supt. Friedman's letter.

Hon. Commissioner please give my letter immediate attention as Comway Hall School opens about the middle of next month. Hon. Commissioner I have no allotment and I know Indians, who get a thorough education can make their own living any where, that is why I always attended school. I am entitled help from the government as well as others, who have not helped themselves so I would like very much to return to Carlisle under my own expense and be allowed to room and board at the Indian School again this year.

I will be very grateful for your kindness, if you will give me your immediate aid, as I wish to take the advantages the government gives us Indians, while I am young so that I may finish my education at Comway Hall.
