Dear Mr. Light:

I thank you for your letter of the 31st ultimo containing the inquiry whether or not it could be arranged to enroll Mr. Asa Deklugie's two girls at Carlisle. In reply thereto I must state that only one of them is old enough to be transferred and as they can probably be benefitted further by attending the reservation school I beg leave to suggest that Mr. Deklugie wait a year longer before he applies to have them brought to Carlisle.

If it would be advisable to let them come here this year Mr. Deklugie would be required to pay for the younger girl's transportation and only after the Office authorized me to accept the younger sister could she be allowed to come on at all.

Trusting that nothing will interfere with the girls' attendance at the reservation school for another year, I am,


Dear Mr. Lipps:

Asa Deklugie, formerly a pupil of the Carlisle school, has applied to me for the enrollment of two of his daughters in your school. Their names are Maude Deklugie age 14 yrs., and Sarah Deklugie, age 13 years. both have attained the 4th grade, as the same is rated at this school, but I think their efficiency as scholars is less than the same grade among people more advanced.

I have told the father that they were rather too young to go to Carlisle, and should have another years schooling, but he insists that I write to you about them. He has some pride in the matter, and wants his girls to attend the school that educated their father.

A suggestion from you that they take another year of reservation school work, will probably satisfy him. I should be willing for the girls to go, if you think they are qualified to enter your school. They are rather young, but Will do very much better in a non-reservation school, than they will do here, and it is for this reason that I would consent for them to go, even though they were young.

Asa Dakelugie, chief of the remnant of the band of Apache Indians at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, has been given his liberty after twenty-five years spent as a prisoner of war. He has a ranch in New Mexico and has gone there with his family. Most of these Apaches after having freedom granted preferred to remain in Oklahoma.
