living now. I can say that  
Carlisle Indian School  
has done more good to  
Indians then any other  
Indian School. Because  
Carlisle ex students are  
doing, what they ought to,  
and they live up what -

I am farming about 55 acres.  
This year, I have already  
put in 40 acres of corn, and  
plant four bu. of potatoes,  
they now coming up. I  
hope to have good crops.  
if nothing happen. I am  
going to put some cotton  
out this year. One time I  
put in about 24 acres of  
cotton, and when Fall come  
the Indians had a fair.  
my cotton was first one,  
Raymond B. Mead 2nd. Both  
of us was Carlisle ex student.

I am living here 55 or 65  
acres broken to farm, but
