Tell something of your present home. *I live with my mother and doing business for her.*6. What property in the way of land, stock, buildings, or money do you have? *I have a farm, but have leased it this year. I bought a pair of mules and expect to buy more.*7. Have you been in the Indian Service? In what positions? How long in each? *I have not worked for the government at any time, although I wish to work in the Indian Service.*

8. What other positions have you held since leaving Carlisle? I worked in furniture factory in Salamanca N.Y. also was a porter in one of the theatres in New York City, and done some furniture work in Penn.

9. Tell me anything else of interest connected with your life: I worked for the Barrum and Bailey's Circus one season in 1906 and after I had traveled extensively up in Canada, and Southern States our show broke up in Richmond Va. and so many of my friends were going to New York City I decided to go to the Great City too. and after several days of good rest in City I secured a job in Livery Stable 38th St. near Broadway, and then again the City life did not suit me just right so I left and went to Barcks Co. Pa and worked for the farmers until late last fall, when the news reached me that mother was very sick, so packed up and came straight home, and now mother is well.

Mr Friedman one thing I regret is that I didn't stay in school long enough to get acquainted with its ways and what it teaches, and I have today that Carlisle is a Great School and do hope it will keep up its good work to uplift the Indians. Mr Friedman I would very much like to get your Redman and other papers published in your school. Good bye

An Indian's Experience in Europe.

Andrew Hays, of Kamiah, who was in Europe during the summer with a show, has written to Miss Christina Paulding, field matron, of his experiences in getting to America when the war began, says the Nez Perce Indian, printed at the Nez Perce Agency, Idaho. We quote from his letter:

"I landed in New York October 1, after I had spent six months in Europe. I was out of Germany just two weeks when war was declared. I felt rather unsafe, although in a neutral country. After some weeks in Sweden, I went to Copenhagen, capital of Denmark, and there I ran out of funds. I had to do the best I could until the next morning. I was advised to go to the American legation, so next morning I went, and found the place all right after I had walked two or three hours. Just as soon as I walked in they knew I was an American Indian, and they fixed everything all right for me.

"I had to wait ten days for the steamer. All of the tickets had been sold and it looked as if I would have to stay in Denmark for some time, but finally they found a place for me, partly by paying for a third-class passage and partly by working. We left Copenhagen on the 17th of September, going north by way of Christiana, Norway, and after a day's stop went to another town to load up. I was so tired I didn't have any interest in seeing the town or the country. I wanted to get back to the good old U. S. A.

"Finally we set sail and left the last town in Norway late in the evening of the 18th. The next day we were in the North Sea. The weather was so rough that the waves were as big as big buildings. People had to stay in their cabins, for the water was splashing over the decks. People commenced to get sea sick, but that did not last long. Next day we were on the main ocean and had much better weather. I commenced to feel safe after we passed the North Sea, for the sea is sown with mines. We had the good luck not even to see any of the battleships. I had expected to see either German or English battleships.

"Were on the water 12 days and we landed at Hoboken, N. J. I was so glad to get back to my own soil and hurried to get off the vessel, when I was stopped by the officers and asked if I had any citizenship papers. I told them I belonged to this country and was born here, still they were not satisfied. I had to look for the immigration man and finally found him. He was very much interested as he is acquainted with the Nez Percés, and quickly made the slip for me to get through. So, here I am in New York."
