My dear Mr. Carn,

I suppose you have forgotten me by this time and if not, you may wonder what I am doing or how I get along since I left Carlisle.

I am a family of six. I have a boy and a girl attending school and glad to say to you or to any one that I have a happy home, cultivating large tract of land and self-supporting and always proud that I can say I have been to Carlisle to learn how to paint and farm. My wife have also been to Carlisle that makes everything in our home clean and food well-cooked for our children.

In another year I expect to bring my oldest boy to Carlisle and to let him stay till he is better prepared than I was when I took up the life I am living.

In these days, I have often thought of General Pratt's advice in saying "Stay here". I realize now that I did not stay there long enough.

These few lines leave me in good health and I hope they will find you the same. I am one of the boys you taught to paint.
