Dear Sir:-

This day, an Eskimo came to me from Mushagak river (300 miles distant) to ask me whether the trunk belonging to Henry Rose, deceased, had been sent to me. This man is Peter Rose, Henry's brother, to whom a sum of money was sent by Dr J. H. Romig. He was told that the trunk contained his brothers clothing and were sent to him. Whether a trunk of Henry Rose was sent from your school to Peter Rose I do not know - but sure it is, none came to my address.

Soon after I came to Alaska in 1906 Henry Rose died, and the following year I had some correspondence with you people about the whereabouts of Peter Rose. I told where he lived but it took until 1911 to get the money to him. Now the trunk is missing and he comes to me for it. I, of course, told him that I had received no trunk but he is not satisfied so I told him I would write to you and you would let him know about it. Now will you please do so and let Peter know what to expect or not to expect. I explained to him that maybe his trunk was held somewhere for express or storage charges.

Now will you kindly write
Peter about the trunk and
send it as above address - Peter
cannot read and most ^{white} men
in his locality are not reliable.
The School Teacher will explain
to him. I used to live on the
Mushagak hence Peters confidence
that I would help him. It was
at my home that Henry Rose
lived while at Lititz and as
I was his pastor for some
years I naturally feel interested
in his brother. Trusting all
will be settled by another
summer, I remain truly yours -

Sir:

I respectfully request that I should be directed how to dispose of the money and other belongings that were left at the death of Henry Rose, an Alaskan pupil at this School and concerning which I respectfully report as follows:

Under date of August 15th, 1907, the following letter was written to Mr. Peter Rose, at Nushagak, Alaska:

"I am very sorry to have to advise you that Henry Rose died here at the school hospital of tuberculosis Sunday evening, August 4th, 1907. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Dr. Norcross, pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church of Carlisle, on August 5th and the remains were buried in the school cemetery. Henry came in from the country on July 3d, ill, and remained in the school hospital until his death.

There is on deposit with the Merchants National Bank of Carlisle, \$89.97 to the credit of Henry Rose. In order to get this money the heirs will have to furnish an affidavit by two or more persons giving names of heirs and stating that they are the only living heirs of said Henry Rose. We are not informed whether the parents or any other brother or sister of Henry, except yourself, are living".
