Why it was a fit supper to serve to any king. We were glad to hear that the students have plenty of most excellent milk. There is no more nourishing and strength giving food than good milk. EAT it, don't drink it, and when possible have it heated first.

The school as a body and many friends in particular sympathized deeply with Mr. Kensler in his sore bereavement of the past week. On Saturday last, Mrs. Kensler, after a most trying illness of two years, died, at their home on Penn street. On Monday afternoon the funeral services were held, Rev.
