Carlisle, Pa., Dec. 11th 1883

Dear Doctor Agnew:

I was very sorry to miss your and Nellie's visit, I have so much here I want to consult you about. Since my return I've been tied up with back work, but am well through and hope to get over it by soon.

I send by Express to Miss Nellie, the Navajoe Blanket, she wanted. The girl pants with it for ten dollars.

My new pupils prove a much better average than any we have had heretofore.

I brought in 115. raising our number to 435. We are to have 30 more from the Ariz. Apaches and ten from the Pueblos, of N.M.

Don't you know of some one who would like to endow an Instⁿ Ind^t Instⁿ, and build it up from the ground

to accommodate 500 to 700 pupils
with all ~~the~~ appliances of literary
and industrial education; this
work presses. I would turn over to
another this which now runs
well and build up such a school,
and it seems to me that a Generosity
of this kind would do more good just
now than any other benefaction I can
think of. It would plant some name
firmly in History.
