JOU and your friends are respectfully invited to be present at the Academy of Music at 8 o'clock on the evening of February 3rd, to witness an illustration of the work and methods of the Carlisle School and of the capacity of the In=dian to receive education.

The program will consist wholly of exercises by one hundred students, representing thirty different tribes, and will show boys and girls engaged in the various industries taught at the school; class recitations by Geronimo Apache pupils only three months from their prison life at Fort Marion, Florida, as well as classes from higher grades.

There will also be original speeches, recitations, collo= quies, songs, gymnastics, drawings, and an original dis= cussion by the members of the School Debating Society, of the question, "Resolved, that the Indians be exterminated." Specimens of students' industrial and literary work will be on exhibition, which all are invited to examine at the close of the exercises.

The school band and choir will furnish the music.

This exhibition is undertaken at the instance of many friends of Carlisle and Indian education, to the end that the public may better understand and encourage the hopeful work which the Government and various religious organ=izations are undertaking on behalf of our Indian peoples.
