JOHN FRANCIS., JR. Promoted from \$1600 to \$1800. I have no \$1800 place in this Office to give Mr. Francis, but as he is at present detailed from the Office of the Assistant Attorney General this special reference to his case is made on the chance that you may have an \$1800 place for him in your list. He acts as Assistant Chief of the Land Division in the absence of Mr. Hauke, and I consider it desirable from the point of view of the esprit de corps of the Office that he be promoted if possible.

John Francis, Jr., whose name appears next in the order of my ranking is detailed to this Office from the Office of the Assistant Attorney General for the Interior Department. He is now receiving a salary of \$1600.00 per annum. He is about 30 years of age, of robust health and of fine mental qualifications. 
