



Dear Sir:-

I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your office Letter, reference above, dated March 27th, having to do with the application of Mr. Benjamin Caswell, for the position made vacant by the death of William Dailey. Your office is in receipt of my recommendation, with respect to filling the place. I have the following additional suggestions to make with respect to the desire of your office to appoint Mr. Caswell to some minor clerkship.

I believe that Miss Margaret Caswell, now in your office, could take charge of the desk, and that she, with the assistance of her father, could look after this department of the office. Such an arrangement, would involve the transfer of Mrs. Agnes Bracklin to some other Jurisdiction, allowing Mr. Caswell to take the place made vacant by such transfer, at the minimum salary for an assistant clerk. Mrs. Bracklin has heretofore asked your office for a transfer. Any change given her should be, if possible, with an increase in salary, as she is an exceptionally well qualified clerk, and an excellent stenographer.

The request is respectfully made, that you take up this proposition with Miss Caswell in your office if the suggestion meets your approval. If Miss Caswell is unwilling to do this, I do not recommend that the plan be considered; as no other clerk would take the same personal interest in Mr. Caswell and supplement his efforts.

We have your letter of March 19, transmitting the application of Benjamin Caswell for appointment to the clerical vacancy at your agency vice Mr. Dailey.

We appreciate your viewpoint that you do not believe it advisable to assign Mr. Caswell to this position since he has not been engaged in clerical work for a good many years. We understand, however, that Mr. Caswell is a man of good character and deserving and we are wondering if you could not fill the vacancy by the promotion of one of your clerks in the lower grades and, if so, whether you could not utilize the services of Mr. Caswell in a minor clerical position. As you know, Mr. Caswell is receiving a very small salary, and if you can work out some plan by which his services could be used to advantage at an increase in compensation it would seem that this would be justified.

Please give the matter sympathetic consideration and let us hear from you further.

Mr. Scattergood:

A vacancy now exists in Position No. 28 at the Consolidated Chippewa Agency, Cass Lake, Minnesota, resulting from the death of Mr. William Dailey, a member of my tribe.

For nearly four years prior to coming to Washington, I was employed at my home agency and I am familiar with the duties of the person holding that position. Such person handles the allotment, annuity, census, per capita, and other rolls of members of the various bands of Minnesota Chippewas (exclusive of the Red Lake band) and to do this properly it is necessary that he not only be able to speak and understand the Chippewa language, but that he be familiar with Indian familiy histories as well.

My father, Benjamin Caswell, has made application to be transferred to the position now vacant. I do not feel that I am making a biased statement when I say that no one can fill the position more satisfactorily than my father can and will if appointed. His varied experiences in the Government service (as teacher, principal, superintendent, overseer on timber matters, and clerk in the Indian Service -- these positions having been held prior to his transfer to the Department of Justice as Interpreter on June 30, 1916) will stand him in good stead and will tend to make wheels run more smoothly. He has been a disbursing agent, himself, and that experience will be invaluable in that payment rolls covering nearly 13,000 members of the tribe are made at least once a year. Further, he isxumantables has a better education than Mr. Dailey had.

Theoretically, any good clerk could fill the position. Actually,

the best clerk, unless he was a Minnesota Chippewa Indian who spoke and understood the language, could and very probably would make a great many errors because a great number of the members of the tribe are enrolled by their Indian names and some have identical names.

Further, Indian names which have no similarity do sound alike to those who do not know.

Inquiry has been made of the Civil Service Commission and I have been advised that my father may be reinstated in Position No. 28 at the Consolidated Chippewa Agency under the last half of the first paragraph of Executive Order of August 14, 1928. The Commission suggested that the only possible objection would be his age.

My father reached his 61st birthday on February 28th. Except that his hair is gray, I do not believe that one would estimate his age to be more than 50, if that. His years have not handicapped him either physically or mentally and, considering his present good health and the fact that his has been a temperate life, there is every indication this his services may be depended upon for many years.

Dr. Wooster of our Office has been at our agency. He knows the requirements of the position and he knows my father. I am sure that Dr. Wooster will be pleased to answer any questions you may wish to ask.

Other than the above, it is good for my people to see that members of their own tribe can take their places among other citizens of the country.

Sir:

I have the honor to transmit herewith application of Mr. Benjamin Caswell, Chief of Police at this agency, for appointment to the clerkship in position #28, made vacant by the death of William Dailey.

In a communication relative to the filling of this position, mailed your Office several days ago, the necessary qualifications of the incumbent of this position, if filled satisfactorily, were described.

I am not aware of Mr. Caswell's having filled a clerical position and do not believe he he has had training, at least in recent years, for work of that character. From an office standpoint Mr. Dailey did not leave his desk in satisfactory condition as he depended too much upon his memory and his knowledge of the Chippewa people. A trained clerk is needed who can place this part of our office records in such shape that it is not necessary for the employe to carry too much information under his hat.

Mr. Caswell is a man of excellent character and habits but I do not believe he could organize the department in the way desired.

Dear Sir:

I hereby respectfully request reinstatement in the Classified Service in the Interior Department as clerk, position 28, at the Consolidated Chippewa Indian Agency, Cass Lake, Minnesota. This request is made by virtue of the last half of the first paragraph of the Executive Order of August 14, 1928.

Justification

Position 28 is vacant by reason of the regretful death of Mr. William Dailey, a Chippewa Indian.

I have all the necessary qualifications for the position as

Mr. Dailey had.

The expense for the service rendered to the Minnesota Chippewa Indians for their "Relief and Civilization" is, in a great part, borne by the tribal trust funds. For this reason I pray for indulgence by asking that preference may be extended to me in this instance.

Answering your letter of December 19 with reference to the appointment of Benjamin Caswell as assistant clerk, position No. 21, the Office has very carefully noted your statements regarding the practicability of this arrangement and will take no steps looking toward Mr. Caswell's appointment.

Robertson of the Keshena School, whom you recommend for transfer to this place has been offered a transfer at a higher salary with Mr. Donner in his new assignment at Fort Apache, and while we have not heard from her it is assumed she will take this place. If she does not she will be given the opportunity of accepting the position at your unit. If she declines the Office has no one else in mind for transfer to the place. With reference to Office letter, dated Dec. 16, 1927, relative to the advisability of appointing Benjamin Caswell to the position of assistant clerk (No.21) at this agency, which position will become vacant on January 1, 1928, by the resignation of Alice C. Marmon, I wish to say that I protest against the making of such an appointment.

Mr. Caswell is now employed in position No. 29 at this agency. He does very well in the position he is serving in; is liked by the other employees; is a good citizen and all that, but has absolutely no qualifications for the position of assistant clerk which will become vacant here on Jan. 1.

Position No. 21 is an important position and must be filled by a person having a good working knowledge of the present property accounting system; of the present cash accounting system; of the preparation of the new voucher forms and be able to handle the main telephone in our office. If my appeals for a qualified and experienced employee for this position are not heeded and if an unqualified and inexperienced person is sent to fill the position, we will be unable to keep the work, including our accounts, in this office up to date, and general dissatisfaction will result.

Mr. Caswell is not qualified to do even a small percentage of the many kinds of important work required of the occupant of position No. 21, and I again respectfully request and urge that a qualified and experienced employee be transferred to fill this position.

I hereby make application for reinstatement in the classified service of the Interior Department and for appointment as Day School Inspector under the Consolidated Chippewa Indian Agency, Cass Lake, Minnesota.

Permit me to respectfully call the attention of your office to my record as Superintendent and Special Disbursing Agent of the Cass Lake Indian School, during which time I did all of my own clerical work.

My reasons for making this application are as follows:

First, the Minnesota Chippewa tribe is my tribe and I feel particularly interested in the education of those who, thus far, have made the least progress - this being the class of Indians to whom a Day School Inspector should give most attention.

Second, I have had seventeen years in the school service and believe that this experience, together with my knowledge of the people and of their language and familiarity with the country in which they live, entitle me to preference when making appointment for the position mentioned.

Third, on account of unfortunate experiences, many of my people (of the uneducated class) have come to look upon strangers, with distrust. Should a man unknown to them be given this appointment, he would - before he could make any progress with them - have to overcome this feeling which has now become second nature on the part of the Indians. I might add that this feeling is strongest in the class most needing the attention of a Day School Inspector and it is my belief that they would not feel unkindly toward me. At any rate, I know their view point and the fact that I speak and understand their language would give me no small advantage when rendering the kind of service demanded by the position.

Beside Mr. E. A. Allen, our superintendent, I may also refer your office to Mr. P. R. Wadsworth, former superintendent of the Consolidated Chippewa Indian Agency.
