

My Dear Mr. Commissioner:

I am just today closing up my property accounts and forwarding them to the Office, in accordance with instructions and as the Office knows I went on the retired list October 1st.

First, I wish to thank the Office most kindly for having arranged so that I could retain the services of Mr. George LeMieux subsequent to September 30th, for the work of closing up the accounts and affairs of the Unit, as it would have been physically impossible for me to have done any of this work in my present physical condition. Even the United States Pension examiners advised me informally to go to bed for several months. However, I am not going to this extreme at present, but I am going to revert to type and try camping out and living in the open. It would likewise have been impossible for some outside clerk to have come in and closed up these accounts, however efficient. Further, in this connection, I wish to put myself on record in the highest terms with respect to Mr. LeMieux's efficiency and loyalty and that his services warrants a material advance in his position. Insofar as I may now do so, I ask personally that he be given an advance.

A very poor showing was made this year in the beet work, but this was not in any way due to Mr. LeMieux's management or lack of effort, but was entirely due to extremely unfavorable conditions generally and both companies will at any time gladly put themselves on record as verifying this statement. If it is necessary I will gladly get a statement as to these unfavorable conditions from both the Colorado and Kansas companies.

I have made personal arrangements with Mr. LeMieux to keep all of my account files and answer exceptions, etc., for as previously stated, it is physically impossible for me to do this work.



I would respectfully request that the Office do what they can to close my accounts as Supervisor of Indian Employment at the earliest possible date.

As to my retirement and disability I wish to thank the Office for having initiated the action, as I realize fully that the only possible chance of my recovery is to be relieved of all work and responsibility, and have the necessary care, etc.

I wish to express to the Office my appreciation of the kindly and helpful attitude of District Superintendent Hammond and Superintendent Brown, in closing up the affairs of the Unit.

Very naturally, after my years of service and especially being an Indian I would like to keep in touch with matters effecting my race and would greatly appreciate it if the Office would keep me on their mailing list for such information, etc., as it can furnish me.

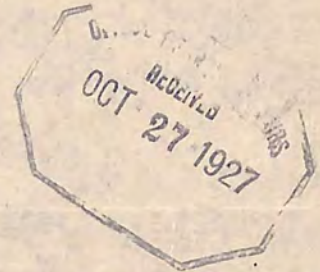

This will further acknowledge receipt of Office letter of June 28, 1927 in regard to the disposition of property under my care.

Immediately upon receipt of Office letter referred to above I wired asking that the date of retirement be expended to October 1, 1927. This I did hurriedly just as I was leaving for the beet districts in Colorado and Kansas. On my arrival at Swink, Colorado, the morning of the sixth, I received Office wire dated the 5th extending the time to October 1st, as requested.

I now find that it will be almost impossible to effect the transfer of the property, etc., and close all matters before the close of business November 30, 1927. I respectfully urge that I be given until that date and that my retirement become effective December 1, 1927.

I do not want to even seem unreasonable in this matter, but on my arrival at Swink and going over all matters fully with Mr. Lemieux, we both feel that it would be impossible to complete the transfer of property and close all accounts before that date.

The beet work is fully three weeks later than usual which will necessitate leaving a considerable number of boys until September 1st in order to give them as much earning time as possible, as many of them lost a good deal of time on their arrival because of the lateness of the season.

Immediately upon receipt of Office letter, Mr. Hammond, copy of which I enclose, but I understand he will be in flagstaff nearly all summer and do not know as yet just when he can give the distribution of the property the necessary attention. Office letter referred to states that the lists of proposed distribution is to be sent in for approval and this will doubtless take considerable time as the Office is even

shorter handed than usual at this time of the year and of course no distribution of property can be made until after the lists are approved, all of which requires much clerical work and time.

Another feature not mentioned in Office letter is the matter of consulting the Units to which this property may be transferred to determine their willingness to accept it. It seems to me that this should be done as last fall I was directed to transfer under the loan arrangement a truck to one of the Units which will come under the distribution of this property and they declined to accept the truck, hence my suggestion that it might be well to consult the Units. That of course is a matter for the Office to decide.

This year especially it is necessary that Mr. LeMieux, clerk, remain in the beet districts to close up fully all accounts relating to the beet work this season. If possible, it is planned to send the statement of the earnings, expenses, etc., to the various superintendents along with or almost the same time the boys return. This is especially necessary this year on account of disbanding the Indian Employment Transportation Unit. It will be necessary for Mr. LeMieux to remain in the beet districts until at least September 5th, hence he could not be available at headquarters in Phoenix before September 10th, as he has a government car and will drive that.

To me, knowing automotive transportation and conditions at our various Units, I would strongly advise that all of our automotive equipment be gone over before the various trucks are transferred. The Office will understand that it necessarily follows that any automotive equipment after many long hard trips, such as our trucks have had, in getting boys to the beet fields from remote reservations and returning thereto, will be in need of some repairs and adjustments, and knowing conditions on our reservations I would not willingly turn this equipment over to the various jurisdictions without having each truck, etc., gone over to the extent, at least, of seeing that it was in good usable condition. I do not think they will require, and I would not advocate, a complete overhauling at this time. But, the work that should be done will take Mr. James, our head mechanic, and a helper about six weeks. I certainly feel this would be a good investment and as stated I would very much regret seeing this equipment leave my custody without doing this.

We also have considerable property in the beet districts in both Colorado and Kansas which cannot be returned to headquarters in Phoenix, or available for inventory and distribution, until after the beet season ends.

We also have quite a little property yet at Fort Wingate, much of which is worthless and was left there to be hauled to our headquarters at Phoenix at such times as our trucks would be passing Wingate running light. The trucks after returning pupils home this season will finish taking this property to our Phoenix headquarters.

As the Office knows it takes much time to make all these transfers and handle the accounts in connection therewith and while I do not want to be unreasonable in the matter yet I feel that for the reasons stated above and many more which I might enumerate I should be given until November 30th to finally close up matters. Certainly that is not too much time. I respectfully urge that my telegraphic request of July 4th be disregarded and that as stated I be given until the close of business November 30th to complete the transfer of all property and close my government accounts and that my retirement become effective December 1, 1927.

Dear Mr. Dagnett:

In compliance with the policy of exercising economy in all branches of the government service, this Office has very carefully considered ways and means for reducing the budget estimates for the fiscal year 1928. Wherever possible to do so various units have been consolidated so that overhead expense and salaries might be eliminated, and in line with this movement throughout the Service, the question arose as to whether, in view of the present organization of the Indian Field Service, the further continuance of the position of Supervisor of Indian Employment is necessary.

The question has been given very careful consideration and the conclusion has been reached that the employment of the Indians can be more economically administered by the supervision of the District Superintendents, than by an independent unit. The superintendents are familiar with the employment needs in the immediate vicinity of their reservations and schools, or can inform themselves without additional cost to the Service, and at the same time they know what Indians are available to supply the demand. The District Superintendents covering a wider range of territory, can also, without extra cost, inform themselves generally of the labor situation throughout their districts and supply such information to the superintendents.

By organizing the work in the manner outlined each reservation and school can take care of its own labor problem with practically no additional expense, and steps are now being taken to bring this about.

The change in the method of handling the labor question

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makes it necessary to abolish the position of Supervisor of Indian Employment, to take effect September 1, 1927, after which time employment matters will be handled as indicated.

The question of disposing of the equipment of your unit in such manner as will enable its continued use along the lines for which it was assembled, is one that will require careful attention, and it is desired that as soon as possible you arrange for a conference with Superintendent Brown, of the Phoenix School, and District Superintendent Hammond, to whom carbon copies of this letter will be sent, for the purpose of working out such distribution.

As the property of the unit has been assembled for the purpose of providing transportation facilities incident to the work of placing Indians in employment, it probably consists almost entirely of complete trucks and automobiles, fitted for carrying passengers, and a quantity of repair parts and material necessary for their maintenance and up-keep, together with certain tools and machinery used in that work. It is advisable, therefore, that the complete trucks and automobiles be transferred from your unit to such units as are most active in placing Indians in employment, including the best work, in which so many of the boys are engaged each summer, and also that the parts, tools, and other equipment used in the up-keep should go with the trucks and automobiles in such proper proportion as may be deemed necessary.

It is suggested that before conferring with Mr. Brown and Mr. Hammond you prepare a list or inventory of all the machines, parts, repairs, tools and other equipment belonging to your unit and that at the conference separate lists be made of the property which it is proposed to transfer to each unit. Upon the completion of these lists they should be sent to this Office, together with a joint report and recommendation, so that proper instructions for the transfer, in each instance, may be given you.

While it is necessary that arrangements for transferring the property of your unit to other units, as outlined above, be completed as soon as possible, it is not the intention to make

the actual transfer of all the property until after the return of the boys from the beet fields at the close of the season's work there. You will therefore, indicate on each list the machines and equipment that will be retained until that time, and you will continue in charge of that work until September 1st, and arrange for and look after the return of the boys as usual.

Please acknowledge receipt of this letter and arrange for the joint conference with Mr. Brown and with Mr. Hammond as soon as practicable.

My dear Mr. Daganett:

Under even date herewith you are being notified of the abolishment of the position of Supervisor of Indian Employment, to take effect September 1, 1927, for the reason that the work of obtaining employment for Indians after that date will be handled by the various superintendents under the supervision of the District Superintendents.

The abolishment of the position now filled by you will necessarily terminate your connection with the Indian Service as there is no other work to which you could be assigned, in view of the condition of your health. This being the case, it would appear that you may be considered for retirement under the provisions of the Act for the retirement of employees in the classified service, provided you make application therefor in the manner prescribed in Section 6 of that act, a copy of which is enclosed herewith, together with the necessary blanks.

It is suggested that you proceed in the manner outlined at your earliest convenience in order that your retirement, if granted, may take effect at the time the position is abolished.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Section 10 of the Act of May 22, 1920, provides as follows:

That upon the transfer of any employee from an unclassified to a classified status, or upon the reinstatement of a former employee, credit for past service rendered subsequent to the date this Act shall take effect, or for any part thereof, shall be granted only upon deposit with the Treasurer of the United States of the amount of such deductions with interest as provided in this Act as would have been made for the periods of actual service, or part thereof, for which credit is to be given, but such interest shall not be computed for periods of separation from the service: *Provided*, That failure to make such deposit shall not deprive the employee of credit for any past service rendered prior to the date this Act shall become operative, and to which he or she would otherwise be entitled.

Section 9 of the Act of July 3, 1926, provides as follows:

Beginning with the effective date of this Act, all employees who may be brought then or thereafter within the purview of the Act by legislative enactment, or by appointment, or through classification, or by transfer, or reinstatement, or Executive order, or otherwise, shall be required to deposit with the Treasurer of the United States to the credit of the "civil-service retirement and disability fund" a sum equal to 2½ per centum of the employee's basic salary, pay, or compensation received for services rendered after July 31, 1920, and prior to the effective date of this Act, and also 3½ per centum of the basic salary, pay, or compensation for services rendered after the effective date of this Act, together with interest computed at the rate of 4 per centum per annum compounded on June 30 of each fiscal year, but such interest shall not be included for any period during which the employee was separated from the service. Upon making such deposit the employee shall be entitled to credit for the period or periods of service involved: *Provided*, That failure to make such deposit shall not deprive the employee of credit for any past service rendered prior to August 1, 1920, to which he or she would otherwise be entitled.

Section 12 of the Act of July 3, 1926, provides in part as follows:

In the case of any employee to whom this Act applies who shall be transferred to a position not within the purview of the Act, or who shall become absolutely separated from the service before becoming eligible for retirement on annuity, the total amount of deductions of salary, pay, or compensation heretofore or hereafter made with accrued interest computed at the rate of 4 per centum per annum, compounded on June 30 of each fiscal year, shall be returned to such employee: *Provided*, That all money so returned to an employee must, upon reinstatement, retransfer, or reappointment to a position coming within the purview of this Act, be redeposited with interest before such employee may derive any benefits under this Act, except as provided in this section, but interest shall not be required covering any period of separation from the service.

A decision by the Comptroller of the Treasury under date of January 15, 1921, states that:

Government employees desire the benefits of the Retirement Act of May 22, 1920, 41 Stat., 614, upon reinstatement or transfer to the classified civil service, an application should be made by the employee for credit for all prior service since August 1, 1920, and after such application has been granted by the Commissioner of Pensions the employee shall be directed to deposit with any Government depository, wherever he may be located, to the credit of the Treasurer of the United States the sums required to be deposited or redeposited by the Retirement Act to the credit of the retirement and disability fund, and to forward to the Commissioner of Pensions the duplicate of the certificate of deposit issued therefor together with the grant of the application for service credit. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

TO THE APPLICANT:

1. All blank spaces on first page must be properly filled by the applicant. Neglect to do so may necessitate the return of the application for completion.
2. Insert in the schedule of employment only the exact period of service for which service credit is claimed. *Do not* include any period of service *prior to August 1, 1920.*
3. Sign your name in full, letter for letter, as it appears on the rolls of the office where employed (Christian or given name should be given in full, not by initial). In the case of a woman who has married since enrollment, both the maiden name and the name since marriage must be signed.
4. Applications must be filled in with ink, or preferably be typewritten. Signatures and addresses must be legibly written, and it is recommended that in addition to the written signature of the applicant the name be also printed or typewritten.
5. Do not send any remittance with application. Should the application for service credit be approved, instructions will be issued by the Commissioner of Pensions as to amount to be deposited with the Treasurer of the United States, Washington, D. C.
6. After completing the first page the application must be forwarded to the head of the department, branch, or independent office concerned that the required certificate on page 2 hereof may be duly certified and countersigned.

TO THE ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICER:

7. The certificate of the administrative officer on page 2 hereof may be prepared and signed by any officer who has custody of official records, but it must be countersigned by the head of the department or by one of the assistant heads, and in the case of a branch or independent office of the Government not within the jurisdiction of an executive department it may be countersigned by the head or acting head of such branch or independent office. The authority to countersign, however, may be delegated by the head of the department or independent establishment to some other officer or officers, provided the person so designated files with the Commissioner of Pensions a duly authenticated certificate showing his authority to act. The Commissioner may, in his judgment, limit the number of persons designated in each department or independent establishment.
8. The Pension Bureau has a record of refunds paid; therefore it is not necessary to give more information in such cases than as directed in certificate of administrative officer.
9. After completion of certificate on page 2 hereof, properly countersigned, the application should be forwarded directly to the Commissioner of Pensions, Washington, D. C.
