The Civil Service Commission has authorized a classified competitive status for you in your present position. Accordingly, you are now subject to the Retirement Act and a deduction of $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent from your gross salary for the retirement fund. Deductions from your salary will commence July 1, 1927.

You can obtain credit for previous service from or subsequent to August 1, 1920, by making the necessary application and deposit. It is optional with you, however, as to whether you do this now, as such credit may be purchased at any time. A form of "Application for Service Credit" 3-R 32 is attached, and if you wish to apply it should be executed and forwarded to the Department through your superior officer. The Department will make the necessary certificate and transmit it to the Commissioner of Pensions, who will notify you of the amount necessary to remit.

Further reference is made to your letter of February 25, 1927, relative to the indebtedness of Charles R. Dagenett, Supervisor of Indian Employment. The matter was taken up with Mr. Dagenett and his letter is quoted below for your information.

"Have your letter of May 10 in regard to accounts of First National Bank, Gallup, and Standard Grocery Co., Gallup, in hands of A. L. Zinn. In reply will say that I have not replied for the reason that I hoped to have some funds so that I could make at least a small payment, and am sending some on account and the accounts will be paid as fast as I am able.

"The Standard Grocery Company't bill is due to the mess at Fort Wingate have suspended in that general mixup and it was necessary that I maintain a force of men to handle the large amount of incoming freight and hence had to maintain a mess for them which I did and at a heavy personal loss, even boarding the Military Representative and the Superintendent. I have already paid nearly two thirds of this bill and as stated most of it was due to my efforts to continue my work at Fort Wingate.

"School facilities had been assured us when we went to Wingate but none was provided for the employees nor provisions made for sending the children of employees to Gallup to school and it was necessary for me to send my family away which almost doubled living expenses and much of what I owe the bank is due to that and to the loss in maintaining the mess, and I have paid much on this account."

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

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Sir:

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Mr. C. E. Dagenett, who is employed by your department and was at one time stationed at Fort Wingate but is now located at Phoenix, Arizona, left this community owing a number of unpaid debts among which was a note payable to the First National Bank in Gallup, in the amount of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) for money loaned to him, and a grocery bill to the Standard Grocery in the sum of eighty dollars (\$80) for groceries. I have written to Mr. Dagenett a number of times, and he ignores all letters.

I do not believe it is a policy of the department to permit an employee, against whom garnishment or attachment will not lie, to refuse to pay his debts because of the inability of his creditors to reach his salary by extraordinary legal means.

Please advise what proceedure is generally followed in such matters.

Receipt is acknowledged of Office letter of May 10, requesting a report on the condition of Mr. Charles E. Dagenett, Supervisor of Indian Employment. As advised in my letter of May 24, 1926, Mr. Charles E. Dagenett preferred to stay in his own apartment rather than enter the Sanatorium, as suggested in Office letter of Feb. 24, 1926. Owing to the fact that this patient had an insurance policy covering "sick" he has been attended by the insurance company physician in Phoenix, Dr. Kimball Bannister. He has also been treated of late by Dr. Payne Palmer, a Phoenix surgeon.

When Mr. Dagenett came to Phoenix last summer X-ray examination at the Pathological Laboratory showed as follows:

"The densities on the right side are those of extensive diffuse fibrous infiltration, fairly general throughout the lung fields with evidence of bronchial sacculation to some extent.

On the left the fibrous densities are much more extensive, with cavity formation at the apex, and more advanced parenchymatous infiltration throughout the lung field.

The whole picture is that of an old, and well established tuberculosis, more marked on the left side."

Also.

Mr. Dagenett, sputum:-"15-20 tuberthe bacilli per field. Streptococci and pneumococci present."

I visited Mr. Dagenett, as per Office letter of May 10, 1927, with the view of ascertaining his present condition. I have seen him at intervals, socially, all winter. Dr. Palmer advises me that Mr. Dagenett has been under his care for some time for chronic appendicitis and cholecystitis. Owing to the lung condition present, the surgeons did not operate. When I visited Mr. Dagenett he stated that he was working every day, all day as usual; he had no temperature and very slight pain under the gall bladder region. Apparently the abdominal condition is cleared up for the present at least.

At my request he had an X-ray examination made, report of which is as follows:

(May 24, 1927)

"Radiograph of this chest shows, on the right side, very marked excess of hilus shadow in the form of fibrous infiltration and multiple areas of calcification, this density extending to the base along the margin of the heart shadow. The upper lobe shows diffuse fibrous infiltration, especially marked at the first, second and third interspace levels and in the midportion of the lung, the density is somewhat hazy in outline, probably representing more recent infiltration.

On the left the costo-phrenic angle is obscured in diffuse density, probably representing pleural thickening with adhesion to the diaphragm. The hilus density is abnormally extensive and in the upper lobe area there is marked fibrous density with possible small cavity formations.

Changes evidently represent a moderately extensive tuberculous involvement, probably with some degree of activity.

In comparision with film of May 29, 1926, there has been considerable resolution of upper lobe densities in this chest, this change is especially marked on the right and densities on the left are much more fibrous than on previous examination."

It will be noted the X-ray examination shows some degree of activity in the lung. On the contrary, Mr. Dagenett states he is running no temperature. From these two observations and Mr. Dagenett's appearance, etc., we would be of the opinion that he is a chronic fibroid type of tuberculosis, very slowly progressing. It looks as if he is able, at the present time, to discharge his duties as Supervisor. I should think that there was considerable likelihood that he

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would be subject to extensions of pathology in the lungs, with intermittent periods of active symptoms. Just now, the disease is apparently quiescent, so far as the symptoms are concerned.

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

One of the agents in your employ, Charles E. Dagenett, who we understand is located at Phoenix, Arizona, is indebted to us by promissory note in the sum of \$133.50, with interest due from March, 1924.

We have made repeated efforts to get in touch with Mr. Dagenett but he ignores our letters and refuses to make any further payments upon an indebtedness which he has heretofore recognized as a just and proper obligation.

We realize that your office is not a collecting agency and cannot undertake to supervise the personal affairs of your agents and employees, but if by suggestion or letter you could bring this matter to Mr. Dagenett's attention and request him to make some disposition of it we would be under many obligations.

You realize that the business interests in Washington are without a legal remedy against a Government employee so far as his salary is concerned, and it is only because just debts have been treated by practically all of the Government employees as matters of personal honor that most of them are able to obtain credit. It is therefore an injury to the credit of all Government employees when any of them treat their obligations as Mr. Dagenett has treated this, apparently without any excuse or reason.

My dear Mr. Commissioner:-

Exceptions to my Cash Account for the First Quarter 1925, office letter dated December 26th, 1924, states as follows:

"Per diem is charged for every day during the quarter, whereas, as the Supervisor had been at Phoenix, his headquarters, for over 60 days, he is entitled to per diem only when away from that place. See Order No. 142, dated June 27, 1923. In order to determine the number of days to which he would be entitled to per diem, his whereabouts must be stated for every day, and when away from Phoenix, the exact time of leaving Phoenix for each trip and of returning to Phoenix from each trip must be stated."

My work ks essentially different from a Traveling Official who is assigned to schools and agencies and my work necessarily calls me away from Field Headquarters a great deal as it is necessary for me to go at any or all times not only to see employers with a view of securing employment, but to visit the Indians who are employed often for the purpose of adjusting differences, etc.

My office and Official Headquarters are at Washington and the Field Headquarters at Phoenix is merely a matter of convenience in order to have some place to handle our trucks and where employers can locate me. Many of my trips are in the evenings or at night as it is usually more convenient and easier to see the Indians who are working either in the evenings or early in the mornings, and in this country during the long hot months, many of the longest drives are made at night as it is easier both on myself and the machine, it being cooler at night.

It seems to me that the work in which I am engaged is so essentially different from that of other Supervisors whose duties are at schools and agencies to warrant an exception. However, that is a matter for the office to decide and I simply submit the case briefly as above, and respectfully request that the Office give this matter consideration and advise me accordingly, and as previsouly stated, it seems to me that there is sufficient justification for an exception in this case.

I would appreciate it if the Office would advise me in regard to this matter as soon as possible so that if an exception or some arrangement can not be made, I can, at the earliest date comply with exceptions as per diem, as I believe all other exceptions and differences of the General Accounting Office have been answered to date with this exception.

I am enclosing herewith copy of Authority 9620-23, and should like to know if this authority applies to the fiscal year 1925. In my apportionment for the fiscal year 1925, Office letter dated July 19, 1924, there is a allowance of \$1,000.00 from "General Expenses Indian Service 1925", and if the authority referred to above applies, I presume I should set aside an equal amount from the appropriation "Support and Civilization of Indians in Arizona, 1925,".

I have not as yet been advised as to what my Salayy will be and presume it will be not less than \$2,000.00, there seems to be no provision for traveling expenses.

While it is true that I put in no voucher for Traveling Expenses for either the 2nd, 3rd or 4th quarters, and only a matter of \$20.30 and \$31.00 for the first quarter, but this does not mean that I did not do a great deal of traveling, but practically all of it was by automobile and as cur funds were needed so badly in our truck operation, I stood all of my own traveling expenses personally and furnished my personal car for a little over 23,000 miles, as the only light car we had was the Ford and that was needed for light work in looking after the Indians especially in the Salt River Valley and around Headquarters and my trips were usually long and had to be made in a very limited time and my personal car is one that I can cover as much teritory in one day as I could in a Ford in three days.




