Office file numbered 115954-123363-1914-San
Juan 175, has been transferred to me because of a statement in letter numbered as per last citation, wherein
Superintendent Shelton of San Juan, New Mexico, asks if
the Supervisor of Indian Employment cannot find work for
a Navajo Indian who is to be released, shortly, from the
State Penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas.

At present the Supervisor of Indian Employment has no permanent Field assistant and it is a question whether it is a good plan to place a man of this kind in a community without some one to exercise authoritative control over him, at least for some time.

Rocky Ford, Colorado, where large numbers of Indians are employed during the spring and summer and where quite a number, especially returned students, find permanent employment, is the only place available for placing this man. The kindest possible feeling exists on the part of all the citizens of the Rocky Ford country toward the Indians and the continued satisfactory employment for Indians in this section depends upon this good

will on the part of the citizens, hence it might be rather disastrous to place an Indian of this kind there and have him go wrong.

I have had a similar case of a Carlisle boy
who was paroled from the State Reformatory of Pennsylvania and he did very nicely though at that time there
was an Assistant Supervisor of Indian Employment permanently located at Rocky Ford to look after this young
man during the term of his parole and afterwards so long
as he remained in that section.

It is probable that if I were at Rocky Ford

I could take this matter up with some one of our good

strong patrons in that section and explain the case ful
ly and have him take the boy with full knowledge of the

circumstances. I have in mind two or three men who, I

believe could handle this man successfully.

Superintendent Shelton has always been opposed to his Indians going away from the reserve and as this Indian belongs to his reservation he could no doubt handle him better than anybody else and would perhaps be glad to demonstrate what he can do in such a case.

However, if it is the wish of the Office I shall be glad to arrange for some one at Rocky Ford to take this young man but would not do so without seeing the man personally and having a full understanding. In the case of the


I enclose you clipping which explains the course being pursued by one of the employees of the Indian Office, a former pupil and graduate of mine from the Carlisle School. Mr. Dagnett is about one-fourth Indian, not more. He is very bright and capable, but with all has always shown a good deal of cuteness. He has been the moving power in the Indian employment schemes inaugurated by Mr. Leupp as a counter influence and to supersede my system of outing at Carlisle. My system placed young Indians in the best of carefully selected families under auspices where their education in morals, industry and in ideas of American life and citizenship could go forward practically on even better lines than it was possible for me to bring to bear at Carlisle. Mr. Dagnett himself is a product of that system largely, for he had a number of outings while at the School. He was so capable after graduation that I employed him for a year or two as Outing Agent to look after the boys on farms and he did it well. He then wanted a larger

salary and wanted his wife, who was also a graduate of the School, to have employment, and I secured an appointment for him asday school teacher at a school where a matron who had given me mid-day meal was employed among the semi-civilized Indians of New Mexico. after he went there he found that he could secure employment for Indians, who were loafing about the village, in the cantaloupe and sugar beet fields, and besought me to help him to get the Commissioner to authorize his securing them employment. This was easily done; I was in entire sympathy with it and the Commissioner authorized it and Mr. Dagnett found employment for quite a number. work grew and when Mr. Leupp came into office he took it up and made it a feature of his administration of Indian affairs, intending that it should replace my system, which he had sometimes antagonized in his newspaper correspondence. Indians were taken from their reservations at the seasons when they were needed for planting and caring for melons, sugar beets and other Western schemes where large forces of employees were required. taking them from the reservations it grew to taking young men and boys out of the Western schools during vacation. living at that time in Denver - 1904 to 1908 - and saw the operations of it. Dagnett came to see me a number of times; always full of brag about the growth of it; never able to explain the unfortunate features. Indian school boys in parties of 50 to 75

Hon. F.K.L. - 3 -May 7, 1913. were hired out by Mr. Dagnett in these melon and beet fields from the different schools and during that period were in contact with the lowest class of Japanese, Chinese and white hoodlums who were gathered many of them in Denver as I witnessed. Not a school Superintendent or disciplinarian who had youths taken from his school in this manner but what would tell you, many of them did tell me, of the perfectly disastrous influences that came upon the boys as shown by their behavior on returning They had grown profane, would run out nights, and to school. were so free in their ideas that in some cases it was nearly impossible to get them curbed back into proper school habit. I shall be more sorry than I can tell if you have accepted this and intend to continue it as part of your Indian policy. Allow me to suggest that Mr. Dagnett's move in this case will absolutely kill the very worthy Society of which he is Vice-President. . If this clipping could go to Mr. Dagnett and he be officially called upon for a full report in regard to the object and purposes and a full explanation of his part in giving this government encouragement to the Buffalo Bill show business, about which I wrote you recently, I think you would get at something of the true inwardness of it. Mr. Dagnett advises the officers of his Society that the Denver people gave \$1,000 which they will pay at once when the Society agrees to come there in the Fall and help by the influence of this Society to forward their scheme for 1915.

Hon. F.K.L. May 7, 1913. As an associate member of the Society, not at all in power in any way, I have encouraged their going to Denver as counter influence to the Denver Wild West scheme. I am surprised that the amount, \$1,000, is so small. Those people could well afford to make it \$5,000, just as the sugar beet and cantaloupe trusts could afford to give good bonuses for large bodies of employees obtained and managed as Indians can and have been managed, which is peruage. 

INDIAN SOCIETY HEAD VIEWS PAGEANT SITE

C. E. Dagenett, U. S. Supervisor, Is Guest of Publicity League; Enthusiastically Favors Council.

Charles E. Dagenett, vice president of the Society of American Indians and United States supervisor of Indian employment, attached to the department of the interior at Washington, D. C., will be the guest of the Publicity league this morning during a tour of the grounds which it is expected will be used for the Indian encampment auring the pageant of 1915.

Dagenett, who arrived in Denver last night, will make preliminary arrangements with the Publicity and Convention leagues and with the Chamber of Commerce for the Society of American indians' conference, which will be held in Denver, October 7 to 12, of this year. It is at this conference that the final plans for the Indians' appearance in Denver two years later will be made.

Dagenett said last night that he believed the Indians would enter enthusiastically into the 1815 council. Dagenett is a full-blooded Peoria himself.

"Denver is the natural center of the Indian population," he said, "and may be reached readily by more than 200,-000 of the race on reservations in the furrounding states. Undoubtedly, rom an educational standpoint, the funcil will prove one of the most wongrful in American history."

Dagenett will be the guest of the Convention league this noon at luncheon in the Albany hotel. He will attend the luncheon of the Chamber of Commerce tomorrow and leave Denver for Rocky Ford on government busi-

that, when he was appointed, it was Mr. Leupp's intention
as he gradually made good in the same ratio to increase his 41051
salary. This has been done several times until he has reached the present amount.

Mr. Dagenett owns his own house in Albuquerque, but the new move to Denver will involve his giving that up and renting other quarters. His wife also has been employed as his clerk. For certain reasons this arrangement has been done away with and she is not now employed.

while I believe that Mr. Dagenett has now progressed to a point where he should receive another raise, I think it would come in very well now in view of the increased cost incident to his move and the loss of his wife's services.

I recommend that his salary be increased to \$2,000, with the same allowances now made for him, in order that he may be placed nearer on a parity with the other field men filling similar positions.
