

Any indebtedness incurred under your old bond which cannot ing be settled before the close of your accounts can be paid from funds applicable and included in your accounts under your new bond.



However, when the Secretary of the Interior deems a new bond necessary he may, in his discretion, require any disbursing officer under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs to execute a new bond.

As the bond under which you are serving is sufficient, it will not be necessary for you to file a new one at this time.
