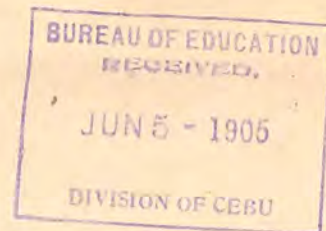

I was transferred from the position of manual training teacher at Phoenix, Arizona to the position of teacher Philippine Service November, 1903, and left San Francisco for Manila December 12, 1903. Received permanent appointment to teacher #1200.00 per annum on arrival in Manila, January 13<sup>th</sup>, 1904. Promoted to position of teacher #1400.00 dating from November 1<sup>st</sup>, 1904.

my contract with the government of the Philippine Islands expired January 13<sup>th</sup>, 1906 but I continued to serve until April 1<sup>st</sup>, 1906, when I returned to the United States.

I entered the United States Indian Service March 31, 1901, as manual training teacher at the Phoenix Indian School, serving there continuously until my appointment to the Philippine Service. I obtained the Phoenix position by competitive examination taken at Cincinnati, Ohio, passing with an average of 83.45%.

Having been continuously engaged in work similar to the duties required of me at Haskell Institute I believe my services would be of value to the government.



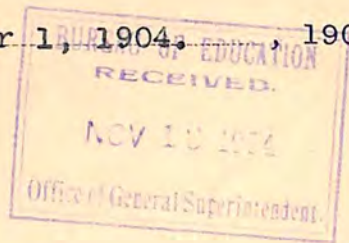

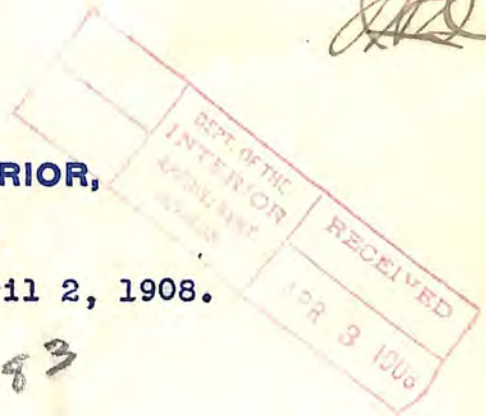
