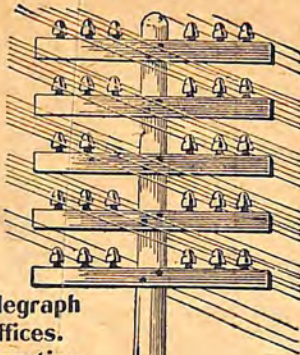

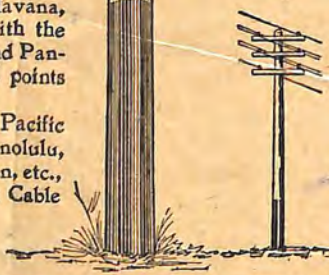

How will this do? Paris from Shoshoni to Chemawa; Russell from Yakima to Shoshoni; and Miss Gaither to Yakima.

I think, however, we ought to pay Russell's traveling expenses because we just brought him from Pima about a month ago.
