Agent Thomas is notified by the  
Farmer in charge, at the Jicavilla Apache  
Agency that the Chief San Pablo has  
notified him, that he and forty lodges  
of his people intend to leave that Agency  
and go east of the Rio Grande as soon as  
they can. The Agent says this means a  
return to their old location on the Cimarron  
and living off the Cattle of the stock  
man of that Country. The Agent has no  
difficult information of the Cause, but

Supposes it grows out of the promises made to the Chief who in Washington a year ago last April. Since which time a new Reservation has been selected but the Indians were removed to it, <sup>and</sup> great opposition to it being done manifested itself with some of the people here, Agent Thomas says his predecessor informed him that the portion of those people who have been the longest at that Agency were entirely willing to go to the Indian Territory, <sup>and</sup> Agt Thomas thinks all of them numbering about seven hundred <sup>or</sup> fifty souls might be induced to go there.

There are two bands of them those under San Pablo number about Four hundred and twenty five. <sup>and</sup> we have never been satisfied when they are, they have hunted on the

Cumaron in the direction of the Indian Tom Tom  
and the Agent confesses himself as quite  
Confident, he could induce them to go.

I would also respectfully call your  
attention to another matter, which seems to  
be of importance to Agent Thomas in the  
management of the people under his charge.  
A good deal of Opposition to his schools  
is manifested among the Catholic element.  
or Church, and not a little difficulty is  
experienced in getting the children into school.  
At the time, the number was procured for Carlisle  
very strong promises were made the Indians -  
None of them Indians have ever been to see their  
children since taken away over a year  
and a half ago. As much anxiety is man-  
ifested by them on the subject.

The Agent has written the Hon Commissioners  
on the subject of allowing a small delegation  
of the Pueblos to visit the school, believing  
it would not only satisfy, but be of great  
importance in influencing them in putting  
their children in school. From the Agents  
representation I am satisfied this matter is  
worthy of consideration. I have therefore written  
about it.
