Sir:

Referring to my letter of August 17th, requesting authority to take eight Pueblo Indians to see their children at the Carlisle school, and yours of the 26th August refusing the authority, I now have the honor to enclose herewith a petition from Tiodocio Suran and Juan Cristoval Garcia, Indians of the Pueblo of San Felipe, for permission to visit their children.

Suran was Governor of the Pueblo at the time the children were sent east and

he has often complained to me of the persecution he has had to undergo at the hands of his people for sending the children. He now states that they have taken from him part of his farming lands as a punishment.

It is very desirable on all accounts that some of these people be permitted to visit their children, and I respectfully request authority to take or send four principal men as soon as practicable.

To Doctor Thomas,

Dear Tata.

We the undersigned Teodoro Duran & Juan Cristobal Garcia of the village of San Felipe, most respectfully call on you expecting your kind attention again on the subject of schools.

It happens that our people trouble us very much on account of not being able to see nor hear from one of us about their children now at Carlyle (Penn) school; for we were the first promoters of sending them there, and at the same time the blame us bitterly for this act. Some of the mamas particularly often are crying saying that shall see their sons, no more &c. &c. Now if we could obtain a free ticket to go there, and speak personally to said children, in order to report about them at our return all said trouble would be over.

We hope in your zeal as our true father and Tata in New Mexico, to obtain said free ticket, to visit our children &c.

Some of our Mocetones, are ready for the hunting of deer, and therefore they need a Pasaporte in order to avoid trouble with the troops now in the battle field. We hope for this favor also.

Furthermore; the pueblos of Santo Domingo, Tia, Santa Ana, Jemes, Isleta, Sandia
