

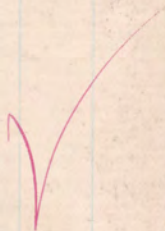

TRAINING SCHOOL FOR INDIAN YOUTH,

CARLISLE BARRACKS,

Carlisle, Pa., August 1 1882.

To the Honorable

The Commissioner of Indian Affairs  
Washington, D.C.

Sir:

In a letter just received from Agent Hunt in reference to the twenty-five children you have ordered for this school from the Kiowas and Comanches he informs me that about a year ago he had an order of the Indian Office to bring from San Antonio Texas to his agency, a Navajo girl and that thereafter there would be orders given in relation to her. He says that he has had no orders since and as the girl, who is about twelve years of age, knows nothing about her parentage or friends it is his opinion that it would be well for her to come to Carlisle and to find an eastern home suggesting that she can and will support herself among the whites if she is allowed to. He would like to send her with the party of children coming here but not as one of his girls as he

wants, if he can, to fill the requisition from his own people. I can receive <sup>and</sup> take care of this girl <sup>and</sup> find her a home if you think it best. She would probably come on half-gare <sup>and</sup> may come at our expense for transportation. As Dr. Lippincott has left for the west to bring in the Indian Territory children it will be best, if you give the order to Agt. Hunt, that it should go at once.
