My dear friend  
Capt. Pratt

Some of the Cheyemes  
did not want to send children to Carlisle  
two years ago, but I talked to my company  
and they sent some of their children and  
I went with them.

For a long time I was on the war path,  
and did not understand the good way, but  
I have cut off my old way, and I like the  
Whitemans way and the Bible way.

When I was at Washington I saw many cities  
and many white people. And you talked  
to me and I remember what you said, and  
when I came home I told the Cheyemes  
what I saw and heard, and tried to get  
them to be good & not get mad & go on war path.  
You told me to count the Chey. children when  
I got home, but my brother, Shave head

was very sick and I staid with him all the time and after he died I felt so bad that I could not count the children so I did not do as you said.

The Sgt. and the other white people <sup>here</sup> were very kind to my brother when he was sick and they gave him a Christian burial and placed a tomb stone at his grave. This does me much good when I think about it.

I remember what you told me and I try to do as you said. <sup>I try to get all the Chev. to walk</sup> in the good way.

I should very much like to have a Spring Wagon like Bob Gails & Left-Hands. Washington promised each of us, who were there at that time one Spring Wagon.

In the past if one man got mad all the Chev. would go and fight - but now if a man gets mad we talk to him & if he will not hear us, he has to go and fight <sup>(good)</sup> alone.

The Chev. are all glad to see the Carlisle children who have returned. I think they will be anxious to send their children now.

Please write to me soon & tell me all <sup>about</sup> the school & what you think, but now I do not feel bad. <sup>I used to feel bad because my friends were taken to Glorv</sup> Medicin Water has a wagon & Cattle & has a little girl in school. I am your true
