The general health of school excellent.
Fifty-two children living out as mentioned in last month's report.

During the month I sent one of my teachers to Dakota for Sioux children. She, with the assistance of Rev. John Robinson of Pine Ridge Agency brought twenty-three boys and eight girls from Pine Ridge and twenty-three boys and eleven girls from Rosebud Agency. They arrived here on the 30th. Fourteen of our old pupils were included in the party. The remainder, with two or three exceptions came direct from Camp.

The work in schoolrooms and shops is steadily progressing.
