Sir:

I have been appealed to by Gen. J. F. B. Marshall, of Boston, Manager of Unitarian Indian Work, to provide a young man and a young woman from the Crow students here to aid in the school which the Unitarians have just established at the Crow Agency, Montana. The boy to act as Disciplinary, and general manager of the boys, and the girl to take charge of the Laundry and some industrial work.

George Hill, one of the young men who have been with us four years from that Agency, is a very excellent person for the young man's place,

And Flora, Wellknown would, I think, do well as Laundress and as an influenza among the girls, and I am willing to let them go. Gen. Marshall agrees to pay the young man thirty dollars (\$30.00) a month, and the girl ten dollars (\$10.00).

I take it for granted that this movement by the Unitarian Board is fully sanctioned by the Department, and have been governed accordingly in my correspondence with Gen. Marshall.

I recommend that the two students named be allowed to accept the positions offered, and request that I be provided with transportation for them from this point to Custer, Montana. These students are really not entitled to return until another year, and it is an extra tax upon us to provide
