To the Hon.

The Commr. of Indian Affairs,

Washington, D. C.

Sir,

For several years we have paid postage on the monthly reports which we require made to us from persons having our students. This has now grown to such proportions as to make the expense a matter of some little moment, and I respectfully raise the question whether I may or may not properly make use of the penalty envelopes for this purpose.

I furnish each patron with blank forms on which he reports the conduct, health, industry, school attendance and any other general information about the student deemed important.

It seems to me, under the law authorizing

the use of penalty envelopes, and the instruction that they may be sent for return replies, we could make use of them for the purpose mentioned. If proper to do so, I respectfully request to be furnished at once with 3500 of the letter size - $3\frac{1}{2} \times 6$.

We have plenty of envelopes and if authorized could print the penalty and official warning on school presses.
