Sir:

I enclose herewith, for your information, letter of this date, from Capt. R. H. Pratt, Chief Commissioner of the Sioux Commission, requesting that instructions be sent by telegraph to the Agents of the several agencies on the Great Sioux reservation to proceed under directions of the Sioux Commission, to this City, each bringing with him the number of interpreters and Indians indicated in the accompanying letter. Transportation and the necessary and proper incidental expenses will be paid by the Sioux Commission.


You will at once instruct the several Agents, by telegraph, as follows:

"Arrange Agency affairs, and, withinterpreters..., andIndians from your Agency, proceed with and under direction of Sioux Commission to this City. Commission will pay transportation and necessary expenses".

Sir:

In carrying out your conclusions to have Agents and Indians from the Sioux reservation visit Washington, I have the honor to request that orders by telegraph be sent to Agents as follows:

To Agent McLaughlin, for himself, one interpreter and fourteen Indians. Agent McChesney, for himself, one interpreter and nine Indians. Agent Anderson, for himself, two interpreters and eleven Indians, (six Crow Creek and five from Lower Brule). Agent Gallagher, for himself, two interpreters and twelve Indians; and Agent Spencer, for himself, one interpreter and fourteen Indians, to conform to instructions from Captain Pratt, Chief Commissioner, and proceed to Washington.

The Commission will furnish transportation and pay the necessary incidental expenses.
