Sir:

I am requested to write you the following letter by Lone Wolf, the principal Chief of the Kiowas -

A great many years ago, while on a trip to New Mexico the Kiowas captured a little Mexican boy, possibly, from what I can learn he was not more than three or four years old at the time he was taken from Mexico by them. He has been raised and adopted as a Kiowa Indian and they all seem to claim him as a brother.

About four years ago his brothers, near Las Vegas, N. M. heard of him and came to the reservation & persuaded him to go home with them; but not being satisfied with the country he returned to this reservation about three weeks ago - His name is Au-de-la, and he worked in the blacksmith shop here for several years, & possibly Dr. Given can

tell you something about him -

Since he left the reservation he has made some headway toward education and seems very anxious to learn some trade and at the same time have the advantages of a good school. I suggested Carlisle to them provided you could take him and they at once requested me to write you about the matter. His age is 32 years - Speaks English very good. If you can admit him and can furnish him transportation I will send him as soon as I hear from you.

I inclose letter received from him in March last.
