To the Honorable.

General T. J. Morgan.

We would respectfully call your attention to the following facts; we, the undersigned five Pawnee Indian young men, students of the Carlisle School, being over 21 years of age, feel that there are certain monies, both annuity and lease money, due us, that neither we nor our friends have received. One of our number, Frank West, was home this summer and he was told by our Agent that our money was sent back to the treasury. He told him that we would have

Pupil, Carlisle Indian

Sir:

Judge Willard handed me
your letter of the 22nd of June,
in reference to your interests as a
Pawnee.

I called upon the Agent, Mr. E.
C. Osborne, for a report in your
case, and enclose a copy, by which
you will see that your people have
not wronged you intentionally,
and intend to make good to you,
on your return to them, all the
property you are entitled to.

As you are not of age, and
your mother is incompetent,
if you wish your annuities paid,

you should designate which
Pawnee you wish to be appointed
as your guardian, and if the
chiefs and head men appoint him,
he can draw your money; but
as you do not need it while at
Carlisle school, I think it
would be better to let it accumulate
until you become 21 years of age;
then, when you most need it,
you will have a considerable
sum.
