* Instructions to Agents require that every change of employés shall be reported to the Commissioner, for his action, at the time such change takes place.

In the descriptive statement the SEX may be designated by the letter M for *male* and F for *female*; the RACE by W for *white*, N for *negro*, I for *Indian*, H for *half-breed*, C for *Chinese*, &c.; the correct AGE is to be given when *known*—when it is *estimated*, a line should be drawn under the figures; S designates *single*, and M *married*.

The reports of "Changes in School Employés" are not to be considered as a substitute for "Quarterly Reports of School Employés." The latter must be made regularly and promptly, without regard to these.

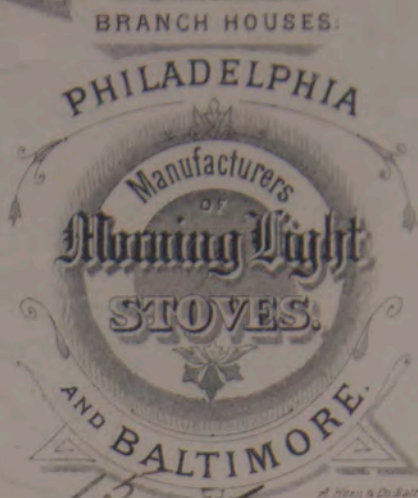
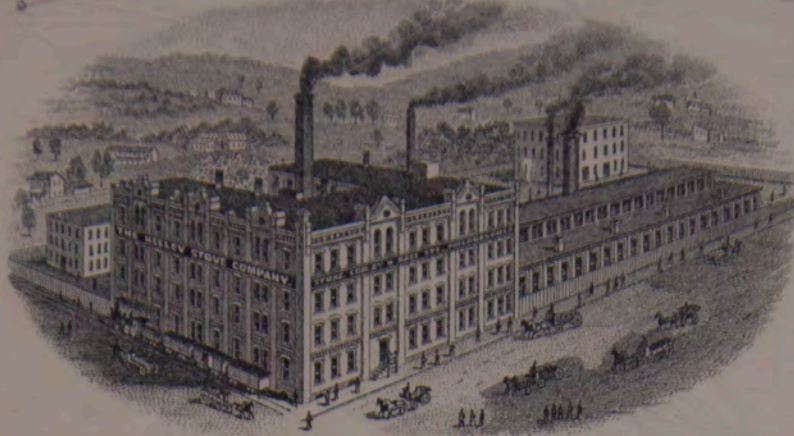
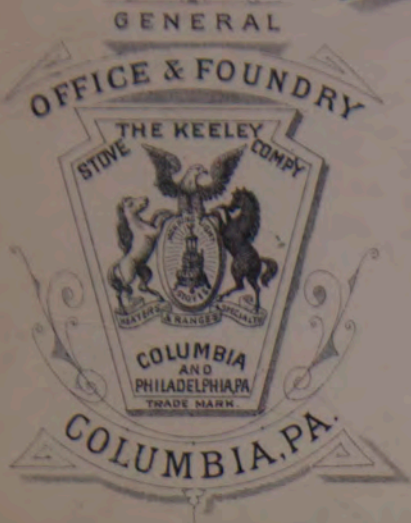
