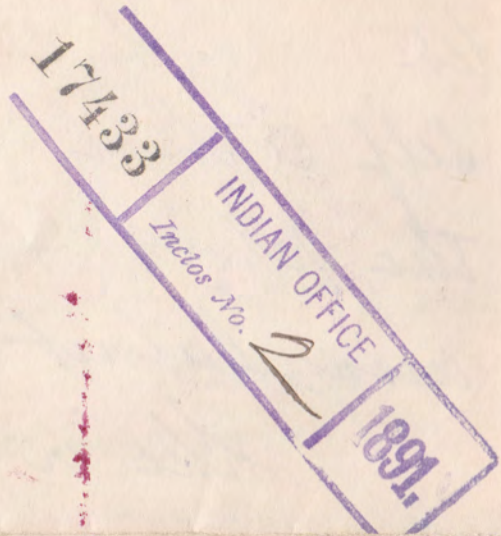

Eva Johnson has been connected with this school since Nov. 1887. She has good mental abilities, and both here and at the town school with which she has been connected during two years past, has had a fair class average - which might have been better with greater studiousness. She has not

been in the Teachers' Training class, because she has expressed no desire to enter; rather indeed objected, when the subject was presented to her.

She is inclined to selfishness and pettishness - but also has good elements in her charac-

ter - and certainly the self-control necessary in the schoolroom will develop any latent strength.

She is lady-like and phasing in manner, and fond of children.
