

My dear Sir:

The enclosed will give you a memorandum of Jenison's conduct, the composition of the court and the punishment inflicted. You will see that he was twice drunk, that the first time he pleaded guilty and the second time not guilty but was found guilty. Jenison has \$15.56 in money here but seems to have carried off about all the property that he had that was worth anything. What he left here in the shape of clothing was what had been issued to him by government which, of course, he forfeited all right to by his leaving. As he deserted and disgraced the school I am not entirely sure as to what I ought to do about remitting you the money as you require.

To the Hon Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Most Respectfully ask your Hon to see to my small matter, or business. My son Jemison has \$15.56. in money at Carlisle, P. A. in charge of Capt Pratt. Since he came home from Carlisle school, I have written to Capt Pratt, asking for the boy's money, and to remit the same to me, as I think he is depriving me of the money, not the boy, and has not done so but retaining the same to this time. I herewith enclose you the letter from Capt Pratt in answer to mine. In this case of mine I have full faith, and belief you have feelings for humanity, and that your sympathy for the Indians, the same will be shown by rendering me aid in my small affair, some may say ^{business} matter, but it is a great deal for me, & will do me

much good, so I will now ask your
Hon to instruct, or order Capt Pratt to
remit me the said sum of money (\$15.56.)
of course I shall give him a receipt for the
same, if it is necessary, I do not see how the
boy ever got home as he did, he was just as
poor as he could be, nothing but rags on his
back as it were, when he came home, so I
did not see the property he carried off from
school, Capt speaks of; a word is sufficient
&c. so I close, hope to hear from you soon
