I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your favor "Education" 33804 of the 15<sup>th</sup> inst, which stated that Jefferson Ausley reported the boarding house at Red Lake was in bad repair & requested detailed estimate for improvements covering the same, which will be forwarded to your Office in due time. In regard to the Cook reported as incompetent at the Red Lake School, would respectfully state that no complaint against her had ever been made to this office. In regard to the sending pupils away to Parishes & Fort Totten as noted in your

Telegram of the 20<sup>th</sup> inst, would say  
that Eight (8) pupils were transferred from  
the Rice River School without any trouble,  
the only objection made was by the teachers  
of that School, who endeavored to create  
a feeling against the Fort Totten School,  
but the parents of the children sent, were  
willing to allow them to go. The pupils  
for Parkville School I have not as yet  
been able to find, <sup>(a)</sup> Some doubt as to  
whether they can be induced to go. One  
of these pupils wanted is a young man  
looking for a trader at Red Lake <sup>(a)</sup> is  
the sole support of a widowed mother,  
his name is James Fairbanks. One of  
the "girls" wanted is a married  
woman <sup>(a)</sup> of course would not go,  
I am of the opinion that quite a  
number of pupils could be collected here  
& Red Lake <sup>(a)</sup> sent to Fort Totten.
