Sir:

Replying to yours of the 21st instant marked "Education, 44652" enclosing letter from Fanny W. Noble, cook at this school, I have respectfully to advise you that in my judgment it is better to make no reply to her letter unless she should further insist. She left the school yesterday unwilling to remain until the end of the month as I desired and she had agreed to and I have already sent in the nomination of her successor. Should she herself or through others insist on an answer from the Indian Office I would of course meet the case, but unless she does I think it better not to make further record. The letter is not Miss Noble's own composition and I think if left to herself she never would have written it, or if she had, she would have been more honest in detailing what actually occurred between us. The fact that I have continued her in the service of the school for eight years is ample evidence of my fullest consideration. Her letter is herewith returned.

I wish to respectfully lay before you the following facts: I have been employed at the school as Cook for the past eight years. During which time I have worked faithfully and well as can be testified to by every employe at the school. A few days ago Capt Pratt sent for me and asked me to send in my resignation to take effect Dec. 31. On asking him the reason for such action he



replied that he wanted to  
Make a change; at the same  
time commenting upon my  
fidelity to him and his work  
for the past years. I come to  
you Sir. with the respectful  
request that I be informed  
why after eight years of hard  
labor eight of the best years of  
my life given to the work  
of the school. I am thus asked  
to vacate without cause.
