To the Honorable,

The Commissioner of Indian Affairs,
Washington, D. C.

Sir:

I forward enclosed document which to some extent explains itself. When the three Indians, who signed the letter written by Mr. Woodord, visited Carlisle we canvassed quite fully the condition of the Kiowa and Comanche Agency, with the people of which I have been acquainted since 1867. The present agent was spoken of. He was a new man to me and one I had never heard of until mentioned by them. The Indians all spoke of him in the highest terms and said he was the best agent they had had for many years, that he helped them individually, more houses had been built in his time than ever before, more improvements all over the agency and they greatly desired his retention. They asked if I could do anything for them. I told them the best way was for them to express themselves to the Department. They said that most of the Indians on the reservation would ask to have the present agent retained if that would do any good. The enclosed is probably the result of that suggestion. I know nothing either one way or the other beyond what I have stated here.

But if it is the Policy of the Administration to put in a Military officer we would respectfully ask that we may be heard, and permitted to select one that will deal with us fairly and look to the interest of all the Indians

The Comanches ask that you present this paper to the proper authorities if you think best you will know best what to do about it as you remember

that the Kiowas shake to you on
this subject - we think you will
know best what to do for our welfare
as you have been familiar with
Indian road for a long time

We reached home all right - after a
day in Chicago we saw the Cartier
Exhibit but was disappointed as we did
not get to see Mr Standing we were
very much interested in the many different
things we saw at the World's Fair
with best wishes to you & family

ask that our present Agent, Maj Geo. D. Day
be not removed but allowed to remain with
us as Agent for the following reasons,

1st We consider him an honest and upright
gentleman, fully capable and perfectly willing
to perform the duties of Indian Agent.

2nd That since he has been our Agent,
through his influence and exertion our people
have been more prosperous, have opened more
farms and built more houses than at any
other time before

3rd That it takes considerable time for an
Agent to become acquainted with his duties
and a change allways makes confusion for
some time.
