
To the Honorable

The Commissioner of Indian Affairs,
Washington, D.C.

Sir:

Ever since the prohibition placed upon the New York Indians coming here I have had constant appeals from parents and from others. Rev. Mr. Runciman, of Versailles, a Church Missionary, urges that we take other children to replace those who have run away in the past, or in the place of those who have been found deficient and sent home. About the time the order was issued against New York children coming here we numbered 75 from the various Tribes. We have dropped to 61. I would think favorably of Mr. Runciman's suggestion, making this proviso, that the children come here at their own cost, or the cost of their parents, for transportation. This will be some little guaranty of a better quality of children and of more integrity of purpose. Mr. Runciman writes that he has just now three excellent girls that will come at their own cost if I will take them.
