Laura Long, Wyandotte:<sup>15</sup> Excellent character. Scholarship good.

Would be especially useful as seamstress or assistant matron. In both these places she has shown rare aptitude. She has returned to her home at Wyandotte, Indian Territory.

*Swarthmore*  
Henrietta Fremont, Omaha: A very superior character. Excellent scholarship. The way has opened and she has entered Swarthmore College, partly at the expense of her friends and partly at the expense of her father. She intends to take the full course, and if her standards are maintained there as here she will come out most creditably.

Melissa, GreenOneida: Character excellent. Scholarship good. Melissa

is quite young and is inclined to be nervous. She very much desires to take some normal training and to earn the money for that purpose. We have accordingly found her a good place where she can remain one and a half years, and in that time she can accumulate enough to make a good start at Fredonia, New York. With this additional training she will make a good teacher.

Susie McDougall, Chippewa: Character excellent. Scholarship good. She has worked as an apprentice in our printing office and desires to remain here another year to perfect herself in this branch of industry. She is studying stenography and typewriting, and has excellent qualities for work in this line. She is bright, neat and accurate.

Ida LaChappelle, Chippewa: Has served one year in our normal department as pupil teacher. Improves constantly. She desires to make teaching her profession. She has already applied to you for position in the service. Would probably do well. Her address is Carlisle.

Alice Lambert, Chippewa: Is thoroughly good. Scholarship medium. Is rather girlish in manner but capable and reliable. She served well as an officer among the girls. Was two years an apprentice in the printing office. She

would be able to take a position as assistant matron or assistant teacher, but would need to be under direction.

George Buck, Sioux: Excellent character. Scholarship excellent. He has determined to earn money to pay his own way through a business college. We have already placed him for that.

Clark Gregg, Assinaboine: Character and scholarship excellent. He has also made the same resolution and has been provided with a place to earn the money.

George Warren, Chippewa: Character excellent. Scholarship very good. He desires to take a business course but wished to go home first. He writes very well. Would make a good industrial teacher for a small school. Could assist well at disciplining and attending to details. He would be glad to receive an appointment in the Indian service. His address is White Earth, Minn.

Antoine Donnell, Chippewa: Character and scholarship excellent. Has taught five months in our Normal Department. Was earnest and capable. He would do well as assistant teacher. Would do fairly well at clerical work. Is a good penman. He would also do well as assistant industrial teacher or in care of boys. He is anxious to earn the money to pay for higher education. His address is White Earth, Minnesota.

Lewis Williams, Nez Perce: Character uncertain. Scholarship excellent. Is at present attending Dickinson College Preparatory School, Carlisle. Expects to use monies coming to him as a Nez Perce to forward his education. Would not advise his employment in the Indian School service.

William Hazlett, Piegan: Character and scholarship good. Is young. Expects to take more schooling. Has gone to his home at Kipp, Montana, where he has a prospect of good pay and will earn money for higher education. Is very capable in care of cows and dairy work.

*Out*  
James Van Wert, Chippewa: Character fair. Scholarship medium. Has gone to his home at White Earth, Minnesota, where a place is offered him. It would be just as well for the Government not to employ him.

George Suis, Crow: Character and scholarship excellent. Very anxious for higher education. Is young and I have opened the way for him at Dickinson College.


I would suggest a place in the south-west for him.
