
The Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

Sir:

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of February 19, requesting a certification to your Department of the names of females eligible for appointment to the position of assistant laundress at the Indian boarding school at Carlisle, Pennsylvania, at a salary of \$300 per annum. In reply, I would state that there is no register of laundresses. Under clause (b) of Rule VI, Indians may be employed without examination in the Indian Service at Large, except as superintendents, teachers, teachers of industries, kindergartners, and physicians; or, under clause 12, Rule VIII, temporary appointment, not to exceed three months, can be made until the Commission shall be enabled to provide eligibles.

Please indicate to the Commission which of these plans is preferred, in order that further action may be taken, if necessary.
