Sir:

You were advised by my telegram this morning that we suffered from the cyclone which passed us at midnight last night. The loss throughout this whole region was quite severe, houses and barns being blown down and unroofed throughout the valley.

Our greatest damage was to the shops. The walls to the west wing were up and the rafters in place; the walls to the northern connection were well up; the eastern wing well up and framed in place. Both walls to the west wing were blown down to a distance back of about 120 ft. The brick and trusses in falling crushed the joists of the second floor and floor and joists of the lower floor. All the new wall fell and part of the old wall while the remaining part is so strained and out of shape as to make it newessary to begin at the foundation. The rear wall to the North fell outward into the roof of the lumber storage room and made a wreck of that. All the frames were blown out and many of them so badly broken as to require replacing.

The slate roofing on the school building, the tin roofs on the teachers' quarters, small boys' quarters, store house, large boys' quarters and guard house were damaged, cupalos were blown off the school building and teachers' quarters and many trees damaged,

some so badly they will have to be cut down.

I trust the authority asked for to expend \$1800 in repairing these damages may be granted at once. I have secured an extra force of skilled workmen, and, together with our own help, still hope to get into shape before cold weather.
