The Commissioner of Indian Affaors, Washington, D.C.

Sir:

Lilly Schanandore came here October 22, 1894, with her eyes in very bad shape, one entirely gone, and I was compelled to send her to Philadelphia for treatment. She was in the Medico-Chirurgical Hospital 35 days. Dr. Fox gave her treatment and performed an operation without cost, and has given her glass eye which restores her appearance. The expense was only for the boarding and care in Hospital at a dollar a day, making \$35.

Mamie Mouchamp came here Sept. 5th, 1896, with a deformed foot which disabled her from getting about. She needed an operation and long treatment. I sent her to the same hospital where she remained 140 days, was treated constantly and had a surgical operation performed, which, with a special shoe, has fairly restored her locomotion.

Olive Larch came here December 15, 1893, with very bad eyes, and an operation seemed to be the only thing that would help her. She went to the same hospital and was there 7 days. Lilly Schanandore and Mamie Mouchamp had to be taken to and from the Hospital in an ambulance which cost one dollar each way, making \$184 in all. For the service rendered, this is a very small bill, and I respectfully request your authority to settle the same.
