Sir:

Replying to your letter of October 3rd, marked "Education, 33466", in reference to application of Miss C.M. Hamlin, a Wyandotte of the Quapaw Agency, for appointment as music teacher in the Indian Service, I have to inform you that Miss Hamlin came to Carlisle as a pupil at 14 years of age on September 19th, 1889; that she is so white no one would suspect her of being an Indian. She was large for her age, and her conduct was entirely exemplary during her short stay. Some relative secured a place for her to be educated in a Convent, and because she was white, and it would make room for one more here, I let her go on July 15th, 1890, so that she was with us only 10 months. The great length of time which has elapsed since, and my entire ignorance of her during this time, makes it impossible for me to give further report.
