The Commissioner of Indian Affairs,

Washington, D.C.

Sir:

Referring to your letter of March 24th, marked "Education, 13, 433" in regard to an Apache Indian woman at Ft. Sill visiting her daughter here at her daughter's expense, I have to respectfully advise you that I have made the arrangements and sent the tickets for the woman to come here. It is a case where an Indian girl does not want to go home, hearing of the adverse conditions under which she would be placed, and prefers to pay the expenses of her mother to come here and visit her, and it has been arranged between them.
