The Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Washington, D. C.

Sir :-

Jan. 30th, 1897 prohibiting the sale of intoxicating drinks to Indians, and providing penalties therefor. I have just had two cases in the U. S. court in Philadelphia; one, that of a white man who gave liquor to one of my boys while riding with him in the wagon, and who was convicted; the other, that of a colored man to whom the boy while under the influence of the liquor given him by the white man, appealed for more. The negro took the boy's money, bought the whiskey and gave it to him. The judge dismissed this case on the ground that the negro only acted as the agent of the boy and that none of the terms in the law applied. I have had a number of cases here in Carlisle, and find this loophole which is understood by some of the Indians, particularly by those who have been associated with whiskey drinking Indians at their homes.

We should be able to reach such cases, and I respectfully suggest that that Congress be asked to amend the law so as to include cases of this kind. I suggest the insertion of the words, "Or in any way procure for or furnish either as principal or agent", after the words, "That any person who shall sell, give away, dispose of, exchange or barter,", making it read, "That any person who shall sell, give away, dispose of, exchange, barter, or in any way procure for or fur-

nish either as principal or agent".
