The two were of proper age (above twelve years) for Carlisle, but the others are too young. We are having altogether too many young children slipped in on us for various reasons.

There are other nonreservation schools that care to have these children. I respectfully refer the matter to you with the suggestion that they be sent to some such school.



Dear Sir:

Mr. Gruett of this Reserve has placed in my hands a letter from your office, dated Aug. 21, relative to the four Dagg children who live near here, attending your school. There exists there a full fledged family row. Husband has possession of land and children. Is old and infirm and cannot properly care for children. Mother owns property but is living elsewhere and is reported of doubtful reputation. It is agreed between them that the husband give up possession of property and that the children be sent away to school where neither parent can be an annoyance or a detriment to their interests which would be the case if sent here. They have all been examined by physician and have certificates of health, Two of which are in your hands. The other two I enclose. I fully agree with parties interested that these children should be sent to your school or some other at a distance.
