Sir :-

Replying to Circular #38 dated April 16th from your Office, in regard to employes at this school whose probationary period expire on the 30th inst., I have to respectfully advise you that Mr. Granville M. Shelley has already resigned and his resignation has been accepted to take effect June 30th. Lida B. Jones and Agnes May Robbins, teachers, appointed by your office, are satisfactory and will be continued. Anne H. Stewart, sloyd teacher, is exceptionally qualified and I shall renominate her. Mrs. Ellen R. Dorsett, girls' manager, has proven satisfactory and will be renominated. W. H. Miller, Treasurer, Students' Funds, is exceptionally qualified and efficient and proves to be just what we need in that department. I shall ask his continuance. Miss Carrie L. Miller desires to leave the service Aug. 8th. A special letter in regard to her case was forwarded yesterday. Mr. E. H. Brock, assistant disciplinarian, is proving to be just the man we need in that place and I hope to continue him. Leo Van der Mey and his wife, Sine Marie Van der Mey, cook and assistant cook, are quite satisfactory, and papers in both cases went forward to you last week from them. C. E. Dagenett, Geo. E. Snyder, Mattie A. Harn, and Dora M. Peters, all laborers on the regular roll, are satisfactory. Mr. Dagenett has applied to you for appointment



elsewhere on account of his health. Otherwise I should be glad to keep him here in the place to be vacated by the transfer of Dr. Eastman to a superintendency. As I saw you a few days ago with Dr. Eastman, and it is planned that he be transferred to the superintendency of a western school there is no need of my reporting him for permanent appointment here. I shall be greatly disappointed if he does not prove equal to the duties you propose to place upon him. His superior education, his <sup>former</sup> services at an agency and his general ability indicate that he will make a success of a smallish school. Mrs. Dagenett, the wife of C. E. Dagenett, who has been a teacher here for the past five months, expects to receive an appointment with her husband. Her long and satisfactory record as a teacher in the service elsewhere is already before you. Elmer Simon, teacher, an Indian, has given excellent satisfaction throughout the year.
