Sir :

Replying to your letter of Nov. 10th marked "Education 66399" concerning the daughters of Peter Chubb of Hogansburg, N. Y., I have to respectfully advise you that Lizzie and Nancy Chubb were pupils at Lincoln Institute, Philadelphia for five years prior to coming here. There Nancy reached the second grade and Lizzie the third. During their three years here, a little over half as long, both have reached the fifth grade. Nancy will be seventeen in February next and Lizzie nineteen in March. Both came here in August 1899. Their father, Peter Chubb, whose letter originated this correspondence, consented to their coming here for five years, promising to cooperate in the carrying out of the rules and regulations of the schools. (See his original consent in each case herewith.)


Both girls have been in the country as explained in my former letter and Lizzie is there now under her own application and the rules and regulations, originals of which are herewith. I forward also her last report. As these papers properly belong to my files I respectfully request they be returned. I have not waited to get an expression from Lizzie in regard to her desire to go home, as your letter states the Secretary seems to require, well knowing if asked the direct question she would probably say "Yes", as would nine out

of ten children anywhere absent from home at school.

I have just had Nancy in my office and asked her if she had written home that she desired to go home. She said she had not done so since returning to the school, but that while she was out in the country she was lonesome and wrote her father that she would like to make a visit. I asked if she thought her experience in the country had been valuable and she said it had been very valuable; that she had a very nice country home, that she liked the people and they were very kind to her, and she had gone ahead of a number of those who were in her class<sup>here</sup> when she went out. I asked her if she liked the Carlisle school and she said she liked it a great deal better than Lincoln and was happy and contented here. Under our outing regulations requiring pupils to save half their earnings, Lizzie has \$42.90 to her credit here and Nancy \$22.90. These amounts are at interest for their benefit when they leave the school.

This covers the ground so far as I am able and understand the Secretary's wish for information.

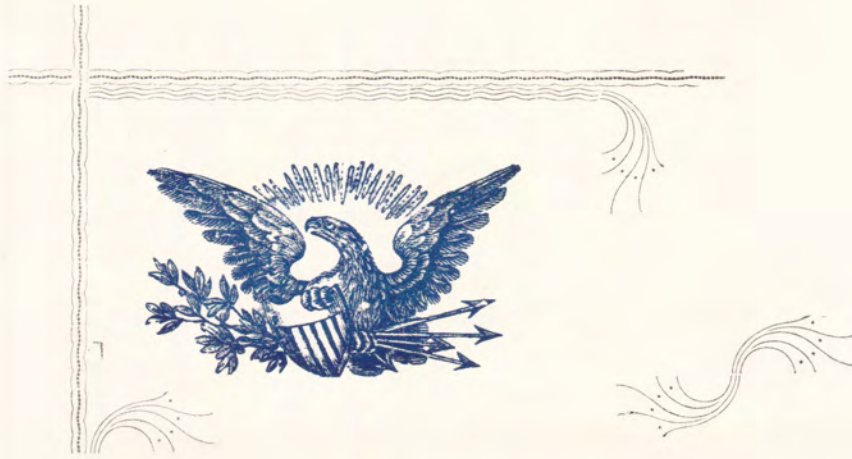

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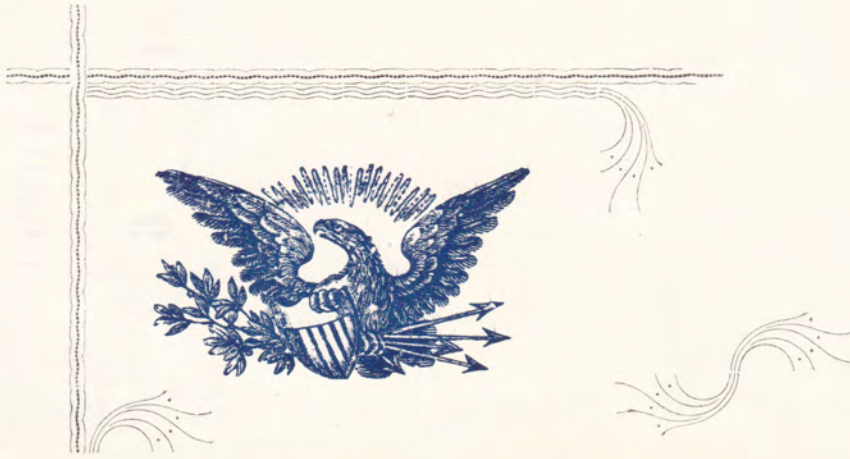

Replying to your favor of the 21st instant marked "Education, 61,985 - 1902 " enclosing letter of Peter Chubb of Hogansburg, N. Y. requesting the return of his daughters, Nancy and Lizzie, students at Carlisle, I have to respectfully advise you that these children entered Carlisle Aug. 30, 1899 for a five years term. Both attended school here until the spring of 1900, when upon their requests they were sent to the country for the summer. In the fall they returned to the school, but were allowed to go out again for the winter in order to attend public school. They remained out during the summer also receiving pay for their work when not going to school, and when arrangements were made in the fall for winter outings, 1901 -2, good homes were provided for them again where they could attend the public schools, that being their wish. Both returned to Carlisle this fall, and Nancy remained here while Lizzie asked to go out again and was permitted to do so. She is with Miss Debora Allen at Media , Pa.

I consider the association and contact these children get by attendance at the public schools in Pennsylvania and the home life they experience under our outing of far greater value to them than anything that can be given them in the best Indian school in the land, because it makes them independent, self-respecting , useful Americans for the

time, and when they have learned and practiced the rights, privileges and independence which other people enjoy they have something which cannot be cast aside.

Indian students attending the public schools are forced to compete with the quick minds of white children and so are spurred to do their best, while in a class where all the competitors are Indians of practically the same ability there is not the incentive for special effort. Going to school one hundred full consecutive days, as our regulations require of all country pupils, gives more than the equivalent of time it is practicable to get in at Carlisle for regular school-room work, if those remaining at the school in the winter go to the country in the spring as they all want to do. For these reasons it frequently happens that students out two or three successive years, or even one year attending public school, are able to skip one two or three grades when returning to Carlisle. This is true especially of the girls, many of whom attend considerably longer than the prescribed time.

I note that many of these letters of complaint are written in the same hand, indicating some meddlesome influence at work upon the parents. We are always ready to give information wherever inquiry is made by parents and relatives and it would be well if they were instructed to address their complaints direct to us.

Mr. Chub's letter is returned herewith.

# GENERAL RULES.



To Govern Carlisle Indian Students and our Patrons.




Students are placed in families to learn English and the customs of civilized life.

1. Students must attend Sabbath School and Church; preferably the patron's.
2. Absence without permission of patron is not allowed; and being out evenings or away on social excursions Sunday are to be discouraged.
3. Students visiting friends must not be encouraged to stay to meals.
4. Patrons or others must not hire Students without my consent, nor are Students to exchange places unless authorized from the School.
5. Except authorized by me, Students are not to return or be returned to the School before their outing agreement expires.
6. The use of tobacco or spirituous liquors in any form is forbidden. This and any other offense against good order the patron must report at the time.
7. When out for winter, Students must attend school at least 100 days continuously, beginning not later than November 1, working out of school hours for their board and washing, and should study and read off hours. Students are not to be kept out of school half days or detained in the mornings.
8. Students must bathe at least twice a week.
9. Monthly reports must show any violation of these rules, and after fully made out must be signed by Students, and their home letters written and forwarded to me with reports.
10. Beginning January 1, 1902 all Students will save one-half of all their earnings. When they have saved \$20.00, that will be placed on interest, and thereafter each \$20 saved will be placed on interest, and kept there until accounts are closed.

**Patrons and students read carefully, and if for any reason you cannot comply do not sign. I shall not place Students nor continue relations with patrons who will not in good faith carry out these rules.**
