
To The Honorable,

Sir :

I have the honor to append herewith in compliance with instructions in Circular No. 103, Education, dated January 6th, 1904, a report showing crops raised, value of crops at market prices, cost of support, etc. of the dairy and the two farms owned by this school.

The details change so often that a full list of farm boys was not kept by the farmers. Four boys are regularly employed on each farm, working a half day during the school months, and all day during vacation, when a much larger number is necessary to look after the crops. Small boys assist when peas, beans, strawberries and similar products are to be picked, the details being large and irregular.

ing and harvest times and in busy seasons 10 and upwards are detailed
irregularly as long as needed, working all day. Details of small
boys to weed, pick peas, beans, plant onions, etc., are sent when
needed. Farmers kept no accurate record of boys detailed.
