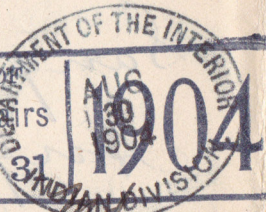

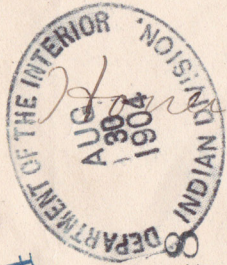

Madam:

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 19th instant, stating that your son, Charles E. Hoye, a teacher in the Philippine civil service, is desirous of placing Domingo Dikit, a Filipino boy, in the Carlisle Indian School, and inclosing a letter from the said Dikit, dated St. Francis Indian School, Eddington, Penna., April 15, 1904, complaining of the treatment which he receives there.

In reply you are respectfully informed that the Carlisle Indian School is under the jurisdiction of the Honorable, the Secretary of the Interior, and that, inasmuch as the boy is not being educated in the United States at the expense of the Government of the Philippine Islands, this office has no jurisdiction in the matter, it being one for determination by the Interior Department. It is therefore suggested that you address the Honorable, the Secretary of the Interior, relative to this matter.

If I write a letter and put it in the office here, they will open it and read it before they send it, and if they see anything about the place they will tear it up, and whip me. The reason I couldn't write to you so often, because we are not aloud, but once a month. If I got letter from you or any body else they read it first before give it to me, if anything is in the letter they'll take it and keep it. I wish to let you know also that too many boys are running away from

from here because they didn't like it. ✕
We don't get enough ✕ to eat. We ain't
allowed to go outside the yard. I don't
study so hard now, because they make
me work. Please tell the Governor that
I like to get that place in the college.
I hope to make a letter for the Go-
vernor as you told me, but I couldn't
get no chance, because my teacher did
not help me. I expect to visit your
parents in June. Please tell them
to keep me ^{there} until I am call to the
College; because I don't want to come
back here anymore. I am very sorry
that I couldn't tell you like this before.
Please do not tell about this to my
parents. I am very thankful for all
you have done for me. I always think
ing about when you were with me,
how good you had been to ~~be~~ to
me; and how can I repay you. Please
do not answer this letter whilst
I am here. I couldn't sleep so much
at night time here, because the beds
are full of bedbugs. This is all I have
to say and please pardon my mistakes.

hoping that this letter do not worry
any of youse, and reach there very
safely.

paper now. That is the best thing
I do here, read news papers, about
Japan and Russian war, and ^{read} story
book everyday. I think I will be very
glad when I get in the College. I am

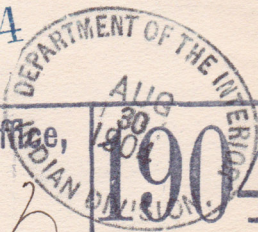
