Sir:

Replying to Office letter "Education 79082-1904" dated the 11th instant, stating that Annie Goitney who was recently examined for appointment as a teacher had failed to make an eligible percentage and could not, therefore, be permanently appointed, I have to state that the result of said examination is greatly to be regretted as Miss Goitney is a full blood Pueblo Indian, and not only a good teacher but an employee whose influence and example at the school are most excellent.

Replying to your inquiry as to whether we have any other Indian to recommend for examination, I have to state we are now in correspondence with several Indian teachers and as soon as practicable definite recommendation will be made.
