Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I submit herewith the data required by the Indian Office--letter dated Jan. 26, 1905.

Because of the absence of system in keeping the business transactions of the Printing Department, it has been necessary to estimate some of the amounts given. They are, however, approximately correct.

- (1) THE ARROW.
- (2) The presses and much of the rest of the equipment were second hand when bought, and have been in use for a long time. A liberal estimate of the present worth of the plant would be \$2000.
- (3) Stock on hand Jan. 1st, \$72. Feb. 1st, \$165.
- (4) The position of superintendent of printing which carried a yearly salary of \$1000, has been abolished. Until very recently it was filled by Miss M. Burgess. The superintendent of industries now has charge of the printing department.
- The assistant printer, Genus Baird (Indian) receives a yearly salary of \$400. The salaries are paid from the regular appropriation.
- (5) The number of paid-up subscriptions on the books between July 1, 1904 and Jan. 1, 1905, will average about 2547.
- (6) The number of dead-head subscribers for that period are 481.
- (7) From July 1, 1904 to Jan. 1, 1905, there has been received from advertisements the sum of 142.59 dollars.
- (8) The total amount of advertising contracts for the remainder of the year is \$87. This does not include about \$50 worth that will probably renew monthly.
- (9) About \$8.00 received for visiting cards, principally.
- (10) Total amount received from all sources of revenue from printing office and paper \$385.36.
- (11) Total expenditures out of revenues from printing office, as above:

(a) Paid for extra help - - - - -	\$ 13.00
(b) Paid for stock - - - - -	-149.04
(c) Nothing for repairs.	
(d) Paid for postage - - - - -	31.45
Paid for express - - - - -	14.63
